

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT AND DEDICATION

The following paragraph was written by our Club's original Historian, Past President Jim Hamilton (1955-1956). He did a wonderful job of organizing and recording the terms of our first 16 or so Presidents. Although the people mentioned in his acknowledgement are not known to us, they obviously did a tremendous job and we, therefore, have left Jim's paragraph as written. In addition, Jim Hamilton is credited with writing the INTRODUCTION and WHAT WENT BEFORE which are on the following pages.

The Historian gratefully acknowledges the assistance of all of the former Presidents of the Rotary Club of San Carlos. Many have given of their time and effort so that the material to compile this history might be assembled. Over many years Mrs. Dulcey Edney, secretary to the Mathews Conveyer Company, has typed and mimeographed the KEYWAY from which much of this has been extracted, cheerfully coping with the eccentricities of the various editors. In recent years, Mrs. Lorraine Lewis has typed many drafts of many manuscripts and letters in the Rotary work of your Historian, putting up bravely with the odd hours and the short notices which have fallen her lot. Frequent telephone calls have been given prompt, courteous attention in the offices of my fellow Rotarians. It is, therefore, with much admiration that the writer of these pages dedicates this work to the Secretaries of all members of the Rotary Club of San Carlos.

Past President John Tenvold (1962-1963) continued the tradition of recording our Club's history. In 1980, he gathered together fragmented records which had been assembled by club member Larry Wise. John covered at least a dozen years.

The ten years that followed 1982, the Club's Past Presidents were encouraged to record their own history with the help of our long-time Secretary Jorgen Nielsen and the Club's History Committee.

In 2004, Ray Snider, a long-time member and Past President John Watkins (1985-1986) attempted to carry on the tradition of Jim Hamilton and John Tenvold. They brought the history and records up to date and will try to keep the History Book current. Since 2008, John and his wife Louise have continued to update the History Book.

During the spring of 2007, Past President Phyllis DuBois (1997-1998) put together an excellent overview of our Club's history and highlights. The project was part of the displays at the San Mateo County History Museum during that summer. We felt it is an excellent addition to our Club's History Book. You will find it on Page iii.

INTRODUCTION

No history can be written without portraying in brief the events which set the stage. The story of the Rotary Club of San Carlos, therefore, must begin with a resumé both of the history of the City of San Carlos and of Rotary International. Since this is not a scientific treatise but an endeavor to chronicle the major events of and the achievements of the Rotary Club of San Carlos before they fade into antiquity, there will be few references made to source material, nor in most cases will there be a bibliography. Suffice to say that most of the material has come from the minutes of the meetings; from the KEYWAY, the bulletin of the Club; and from personal notes of the former Presidents of the Club. It is the dream of your Historians that this work, once completed, will become self-sustaining. With this thought in mind, the Bylaws of the Rotary Club have been so amended that the last duty of each president is delineated as writing and submitting a history of his year. So that such additions may be appended to the copy in the possession of each of the members it is anticipated that these summaries will be distributed early in each new administration. This history will be prepared in a loose-leaf format so that new material may be inserted with ease.

Nothing can be written with such objectivity that the viewpoints of the writer fail to creep in. If, through the ensuing pages, there appears a pervading feeling of affection for and of pride in the Rotary Club of San Carlos it is only because these feeling are present.

WHAT WENT BEFORE

San Carlos, California, was originally settled by one of the Costanoan tribes of Penutian Indians. Its location, in a hollow of the hills gently sloping eastward towards San Francisco Bay and watered by three briskly flowing creeks, made it an ideal location for permanent habitation. The forests surrounding abounded in game; the water of the bay abounded in fish and clams. It had, therefore, all that was needed for a self-containing community.

It is not known when the Conquistadors made their first settlement in San Carlos. The city was on the pathway taken by the party of Father Junipero Serra. It is assumed that this was the first time white men had set foot in San Carlos. Early in San Francisco history, however, it became the site of outlying estates of wealthy San Franciscans. Later, as trails grew to roads, more and more San Francisco residents established summer estates and week-end retreats in San Carlos, as they did in other Peninsula locations. Agriculture began to thrive. With the advent of suburban residence and agriculture it was inevitable that services should follow. Stores, restaurants, inns and repair shops soon were established. Communities began to assume identity. San Carlos was incorporated in 1925.

Prior to World War II San Carlos remained a small commuter community with a population of about three thousand. The main street, now called San Carlos Avenue, had two central strips of cypress and eucalyptus trees. Most streets had generous shade provided by ancient white oaks.

Houses were gracious, surrounded by broad estates, dotted both with white oaks and with live oaks. If a dominant crop arose it was flowers: acacia, chrysanthemums, asters, heather and stock. The most successful orchard crops were walnuts and apricots. Industries were few and small. The Southern Pacific provided commuter service. Street lights existed only in the downtown section. The vista, then, as viewed from one of the many high hills would have been that of a small shopping section on the flat lands edged on the Bay-side by the railroad right-of-way and by El Camino Real. Flanking this on the remaining flatlands towards the surrounding hills to the west were widely separated homes, each with its oasis of green and of garden and orchard, punctuated by colorful rectangles of flower crops.

Then came World War II and the postwar expansion. The population grew explosively, moving largely into tract types of homes. Light industry flowed out from San Francisco. The electronics industry seemed first to find its cradle in San Carlos until several of the more successful firms found that moving or establishing branches elsewhere became necessary. Specialization of many professions became established. The larger chain stores installed branches in or near the city. Agricultural land gave way to residential land. The downtown area spread southward along El Camino Real and Laurel Street. Apartments were erected on lands now too valuable for single residences. Schools, multiple fire stations, paved streets, street lighting, sewage disposal and other signs of a thriving community made their appearance. The business section spread to and became continuous with the business sections of neighboring Belmont and Redwood City, and the San Carlos we now know came about.

Early in the 20th century, at the time of high starched collars and of <u>caveat emptor</u>, a handful of youngish men in Chicago, representing different vocations, met together to form an association whose primary purpose was to throw business each other's way. This association was given the name of the Rotary Club because its weekly luncheon meetings were held in rotation at the offices of its members. The club thrived and grew. Its official birthdate was February 23, 1905, which now, of course, is the date which Rotary International acknowledges as its birthday.

In June, 1908, Manuel Munoz, a member of the Chicago Club, brought the message of Rotary to San Francisco. He and Homer W. Wood were among were among the sparkplugs who organized the Rotary Club of San Francisco. The spread of Rotary was rapid on the West Coast under the sponsorship of the San Francisco Club, so that the year 1909 saw the birth of the next three Rotary Clubs: Oakland, Seattle and Los Angeles. Before long the prevalent purpose of throwing business to other members (exemplified by the fact that part of every meeting was devoted to having each member announce how much business had he steered to other members) was replaced by the more mature spirit of service to others; and the growth of Rotary was assured.

In March, 1914, the 116th Rotary Club was chartered in San Jose, with many members of the San Francisco and Oakland Clubs in attendance. By this time Rotary was firmly entrenched in Canada and in Great Britian. Each club, however, was empowered to write not only its own bylaws but also its own constitution. This automatically created a certain amount of divergence of purpose. The San Jose Club sponsored many new clubs. Of these, the Rotary Club of Palo Alto came into being in April 1922. Rotary had spread, by this time, to the European continent, South America, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, and the Philippines and Japan, achieving a

truly international status. In June of that year the Rotary International Convention had passed an enactment requiring all Rotary Clubs formed after that convention to conform to a Standard Constitution; the remainder have made sufficient changes so that theirs depart from the standard only in wording and not in meaning.

In 1946, under the sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Palo Alto, the Rotary Club of Redwood City was chartered. Its original territory covered San Mateo County south of the San Mateo border. It is not astonishing, therefore, that the Redwood City Club soon was beset, in the rapid postwar expansion, by subgroups of its own membership who desired to form clubs within their own municipal borders. Thus, the Rotary Club of Menlo Park split out of the Redwood City Club in 1947 and was followed soon thereafter by the Rotary Club of San Carlos which was chartered in January 1949 under the sponsorship of its parent club, Redwood City.

Each charter member of the Rotary Club of San Carlos was given a booklet entitled "A Message of Welcome to a Charter Member." This was published by Rotary International. It was signed by Harold D. Bostock, who at that time was the District Governor, and was dated on the night of the charter dinner, 14 February 1949. The opening words were: "Greetings and felicitations are hereby extended to you as a charter member of your newly admitted Rotary Club." It closed with: "You are at the threshold of a great experience. May your Rotary membership be profitable to you and to those with whom you come in contact." In closing this introduction we cannot help but muse that our membership has indeed been of profit to us and we sincerely hope to all with whom we have been in contact both through and outside the world of Rotary.

THE FIRST SIXTY-EIGHT YEARS OF OUR CLUB 1949 - 2017

Established in 1949, the San Carlos Rotary Club's membership was 19; one of the Charter members - Chuck Baker - is still active. In 1990, membership reached 94. The Club met at Bondy's Restaurant in Belmont and individual lunches cost \$1.25. Dues were \$20 per year. The first fund-raiser was an amateur boxing show at the Belmont Stadium and the first international project was sending bundles of usable clothing to Europe.

Fund-raising

From the "Kids Fish Derby" at Princeton pier (1951), and toss the 'ping-pong ball into the fish bowl' booth at the Peninsula Community Fair to the 27-year run of the Junktique Auction, engineered and coordinated by Art Farnham, these fund-raisers successfully brought the Club into the 1980's.

The Dixieland Jazz Jamboree, the brainchild of Gailerd Smith and invaluable leadership of Arthur Pollock, began in 1983 with 6 bands. The event eventually expanded with 22 Peninsula Rotary

Clubs participating and 16 bands performing at the San Mateo Fairgrounds. "Eleven years: a spirited and well-received fund-raiser!"

In the 1990's, Live and Silent Auctions became the money-generating choice of many non-profits. Our Club embraced and incorporated the auction idea for 13 years, 5 of which were in conjunction with The Night at the Oscars galas and 2 Oktoberfests.

Two other highly-visible community events came on the scene with the advent of the San Carlos Hometown Days celebration: (1) the Pancake Breakfast (37 years), spearheaded by Bill Lindeburg (1980) and (2) the Fun Run (26 years), researched and executed by Jon Stocum, Terry Andreacchi and Terry Wilson and Bruce Paris (1991).

Community Contributions

The concept of Long Range Planning, the vision of Don Kinsley, President 1983-84, greatly helped accomplish the following projects and more...over the years, the San Carlos Rotary has

- built a Little League field at Arundel Park
- presented the "Jaws of Life" to the San Carlos Fire Department
- installed the banner poles above Laurel Street at the Post Office
- given, on separate occasions, 3 highly-trained German Shepherds to the SCPD
- raised close to \$190,000 to eradicate polio worldwide
- established the sports field at Highlands Park North and erected an electronic scoreboard thereon
- raised \$150,000 to help build the 2.5 million-dollar San Carlos Youth Center
- placed decorative trash receptacles along Laurel Street at a cost of \$20,000
- awarded, annually, student scholarships, most recently, in the amount of \$19,000

Notable notes:

Jorgen Nielsen reigned supreme as Club Secretary for 17 years, before his death in 2002 – perhaps the longest term in Rotary history!

Cameron Miller, President 1998-99 implemented an Endowment for the Club to provide income for educational projects we sponsor. To date the Endowment has grown to over \$1,000,000.

The San Carlos Chamber of Commerce, yearly, honors one outstanding individual who has tirelessly and generously devoted time and energy to improving our community for the benefit of all. Rotarians among this auspicious group are

WHAT IS TO FOLLOW

In preparing a history such as this it would have been helpful if one could peruse the records and extract that which would have been of interest. It became obvious early, however, that this could not be the case. Different persons keep varying types of records. This history will be recorded in chapters named not for the year of the president's office but by his name with the dates underneath. At the top of each chapter will be statistics: the size of the club, the other officers of the club, members gained and lost, and so forth. These data, then, will be available for those who are fact-minded. The narrative may be pursued by those who are narrative-minded merely by omitting reading of the "dry"facts. We trust that the ensuing pages will be of pleasure to all readers, will bring information to those who have joined or will join the club since the events chronicled, and will evoke a smile of personal reminiscence to those who have joined or will join the club since the events chronicled, and will evoke a smile of personal reminiscence to those whose names weave through the pages to come.

Since this book has been handled by a number of Club Historians, there are several changes in format. You will note that some reports are written by the Historian, and in more recent years, the Past Presidents have recorded their own year.

THE CHARTER GROUP

The Rotary Club of San Carlos was somewhat unique in its beginning. No special representative of the District Governor sat with a nucleus to plan the organization. No survey by the sponsor club was made to ascertain whether the city had a Rotary potential. The formal survey was made by the charter group themselves. That group existed as members of the Rotary Club of Redwood City. The Club came into being because the San Carlos members desired a club of their own and because the Redwood City members desired the split so that they themselves could become stabilized. The first meetings of the group, prior to becoming a provisional club, were held in the home of Randy Cathcart and in the office of Jim Hamilton. Dan Robertson, past president of the Redwood City Club, sat in on the first. The principal business of those meetings, beyond becoming further acquainted, was to discuss potential San Carlans to bring the charter membership up to the required twenty mark. The first meeting, alluded to above, was held 10 September 1948. On 4 October 1948, Rotary International granted the group status as the PROVISIONAL ROTARY CLUB OF SAN CARLOS . The first meeting of the entire group was held at Bondy's Restaurant. The order of business was to adopt the recommended bylaws, to decide upon Friday noon as the time for the regular meetings, and to elect officers:

Thereafter, the Provisional Club met weekly on Fridays at noon until it was granted its charter by Rotary International, dated 5 January 1949. The members who had split out of the Redwood City Club also met on Tuesdays with the Redwood City Club since, on those days, the meeting of the provisional club did not constitute an official attendance.

Bouncy and jocular, resembling Rudy Vallee in appearance, always sunny in disposition, Randy Cathcart was an ideal charter president for the new Rotary Club of San Carlos. Every meeting, after the salute to the flag, the song, and the invocation, was opened by a joke so shaggy that it set a tone of informal fellowship. We had no piano. Singing was led by a quartet consisting of Chuck Baker, Ernie Baker, Art Farnham and Jim Hamilton, with the key provided by a pitch pipe. Visitors rapidly found the new club, in its fine setting at Bondy's Restaurant in Belmont, one of their favorite make-up clubs. They admired and enjoyed the spirit of fellowship. They enjoyed the greeting song, the first to be used by any Peninsula Club. They commented on the club courtesy in giving a standing applause to each speaker after his introduction. And they soon outnumbered home club members at almost every meeting.

Carl Holvick was the first editor of THE KEYWAY. He devised the first masthead and produced a lively informative sheet. Attendance, under the guidance of John Coss and Noel Pennington remained perfect for the first several meetings and led the district for the first year of the Club's existence. Ferd Reed was in charge of the first Classification Committee and Milt Lauterwasser of the first Rotary Information Committee. Both set the high standards for these vital committees which have been maintained thereafter. Jim Hamilton was the program chairman.

Early objectives of the new club were to find projects and to increase the level of Rotary Information. In order to bring Rotary Information topics to the floor palatably, new members were asked questions in this vein. If they were unable to answer the questions their sponsors were fined for failure to indoctrinate them properly. The first new members brought into the club under these hectic conditions were:

. There was only one resignation during the first year and a half, that of Bob Baskett.

With the close feeling between the two clubs it is not astonishing that the first special event of the San Carlos Club was to host a joint ladies' day meeting with the Redwood City Club. The new club also hosted a dinner meeting of all the San Carlos Service Clubs: Kiwanis, Lions, Soroptimists, Business and Professional Women, and 20-30 Club. The feature of this meeting was a quartet contest. How many remember our "Three Bases and a Bootlegger" and their strange rendition of "Kentucky Babe"? The Club also hosted the Rotary Club of San Bruno in a joint meeting at Bondy's.

Community services also went off to a rapid start with the sponsorship of Boy Scout Troop 153, Ken O'Neill serving as our representative. During this administration camperships for blind children, diabetic children, boy scouts and girl scouts were granted. Under the general chairmanship of John Coss an amateur boxing show was successfully produced at the Belmont Stadium, whose use was donated by Ted Smyth. John was ably assisted in this project by Ken O'Neill, Lou Goss, Ray Dixon and Milt Lauterwasser. Mell Schroeder and Jim Hamilton examined the contestants. All members sold tickets and assisted at the show itself; and the Club had its baptism in the pleasures of a project in which all worked together. In the meanwhile the first hesitant steps were taken in the field of International Service with a project which consisted of collecting bundles of usable clothing for Europe. This project, coordinated by Jim Hamilton and Noel Pennington, also enlisted the service of many of the members and was limited largely by the small budget available to a new club for postage and packaging.

And so the first administration of the Rotary Club of San Carlos ended, with a small club bursting into district leadership in attendance, hosting its sponsor club, another Friday-noon club, and all of the other service clubs in the city at joint meetings, and becoming a popular make-up club amongst its Rotary neighbors. It became noticeable in its community for services performed and barely wet its feet in the avenue of International Service. About his year, Randy reminisced in a letter to the Historian, "I shudder to think that the primary memory by others may be only that I told a lot of corny jokes - tho I do feel the latter may have helped our visitor and member attendance. Having been on the Board at that time, you will recall we burnt a considerable amount of midnight oil, and I am sure it wasn't all on jokes!" And so it wasn't, Randy.

With smooth black hair just beginning to gray at the temples and a smile reminiscent of Ricardo Cortez of the silent movies, Lou opened each meeting with his shrill tenor: "Hi, Gang!". If the response was not loud enought the ritual would be repeated until he was satisfied. We were soon beaten into submission and into a prompt noisy, "Hi, Lou!". Then, and only then, could the meeting proceed. The general atmosphere of cordiality of the Club continued, keeping us favored as a make-up place for neighboring Rotarians. But some of the problems of adolescence appeared in this year; some members raised their voices in objection to the rising applause to the speaker as he was introduced. The Board decided to omit this step. Then other members voiced their disappointment that it was no longer continued. By Board action it was put to a vote of the Club. The majority voted to retain the custom, but it had lost its spontaneity and disappeared of its own. A distinguishing characteristic of the Club had fallen into disuse. We also became the owners of a second-hand piano, which led to the appointment of Art Farnham as Pianist and Jim Hamilton as Song Leader. Our group singing continued noisy but there was no longer the need for the leadership of the quartet, which also fell by the wayside. Next came the clamor that the Welcome Song was too corny. It remained in use but a committee was appointed to write a new one. These problems within the administration of the Club did not show upon the surface, however, nor did they affect the level of service achieved by the Club. Some of the bundles which had been collected for Europe were diverted to Pakistan following an appeal by District Governor Bill Williams for clothing for that country. The Club undertook the physical examination of Girl Scouts and of members of our own Boy Scout Troop 153 prior to going to camp. A traffic safety survey of the city of San Carlos was completed, mapping all traffic hazards such as high hedges, chuck holes, chronically parked cars near intersections, and streets needing STOP or CAUTION signs. This survey was done by the scouts of Troop 153, patrol by patrol. A prize was awarded the patrol turning in the best survey. In the meanwhile tents and packboards were given to Troop 153. Plans were made for a children's fish derby to be held at the Coast during the following administration. Camperships were disbursed for Blind, Diabetic and YMCA. Contributions were also made to Guide Dogs for the Blind and to the Peninsula Symphony. A gift was appropriated for the new South San Francisco Club; - we were also requested to supply the Song Leader for their Charter Dinner. Seven subscriptions to the ROTARIAN were placed in the libraries of San Carlos and Belmont Schools and in local sanatoria and hospitals. The Club provided sponsorship and chaperons for two teen-age dances at the new American Legion building.

Carl Holvick turned in a tremendous New Projects Committee report containing thirteen possibilities. This report was to be worked over by the succeeding Board.

A high spot in the year came when Past Governor Herb Shuey unexpectedly brought Past International President Angus Mitchell of Australia to visit and to address the Club extemporaneously. This provided the Club with its first tangible contact with Rotary International.

So the year ended with many small projects well carried out, with many new irons in the fire, and with a sustained attendance and hospitality performance, but with some dissention from within.

Poised and urbane, Wally conducted a meeting which reflected his familiarity with Roberts Rules. The fun and informality remained. Lloyd Underwood put out the KEYWAY. The KEYWAY, full of satire, added much to the merriment of the meetings. Nevertheless, some of the problems referred to in the last chapter came to the surface. This required a greater number of President's meetings than in previous years. The old corny welcome song was replaced by a still cornier one replete with handshakes with the man across the table. This song had its brief flurry and then dwindled away. Another outstanding feature of the Club has slid away.

Early in the year the Kid's Fish Derby was successfully put on at Hazel's Pier in Princeton. With the resignation of Ken O'Neill, Lou Goss took over the job as Institutional Representative to Troop 153. The rising cost of everything led to an increase in costs of meals from \$1.25 to \$1.50. In separate amendments to the bylaws, first the initiation fee and then the annual dues were increased from twenty to thirty dollars.

Bondy's Restaurant was sold and renamed Fisherman's Grotto and then the Oyster Loaf. With each change, the food and quarters deteriorated, so that the Club soon found itself without a suitable meeting place. After a few one-meeting stands and a few consecutive weeks in the Casino in Belmont a permanent stop was made at the Bel Aire in Belmont. Two or three members proposed projects which the Board found unsuitable. The Trout Derby, which had been proposed by Carl Holvick's New Projects Committee, was endorsed by the Board and was adopted by a vote of the Club. However, the members who has proposed other projects remained vocally opposed to the project - dividing the Club into factions. As Wally reported to the writer: ". . . . the Club esprit de corps was serverely damaged by frequent moves of luncheon meeting place and the Fish Derby project caused some dissention". Nevertheless, the Fish Derby was completed. Its first phase was a booth at the Redwood City Rodeo at which Lou Goss and Jim Hamilton tied trout flies which were to be sold or to be given to each purchaser of an entry in the Fish Derby. Then came a kick-off luncheon at which all of the fish and game editors of the Bay Area newspapers were guests. They lauded the derby and played it up well in their columns. Entry blanks sales remained poor, however, and in the last analyses the project accomplished little beyond clearing its own expense and dividing what had been an harmonious club. The Joint Ladies' Day meeting with Redwood City was again a successful affair under the chairmanship of Carl Holvick. A salmon trip organized by Wes Rusk became the first fellowship activity in group recreation. This brought much fun, seasickness and fines. The Club continued furnishing subscriptions to the ROTARIAN to local schools and hospitals, continued its project of providing precamp physical examinations to boy and girl scouts, and continued providing camperships.

and so despite much work by many members of the Club, inner turmoils had lowered morale to a dangerous level. Had it not been for the masterful statesmanship of Wally Truce and his Board of Directors the Club might have been permanently demoralized. But the Club had ended the year with much accomplished in smaller projects and with a will to heal itself. This self-healing was to be the challenge of subsequent administrations.

Carl Holvick, gentle, quiet, even-dispositioned, looking like a crew-cut college boy, took over at the troubled times which closed the last year. He was an ideal choice for what we might call the "quiet year." His meetings were pleasantly humorous. He laid great stress upon fellowship and program quality. All efforts were made, by Carl's direction and with Board backing, to make this a year of fellowship whose primary objectives would be to begin the process of healing rifts within the Club, as will be brought out by the following quotations from the minutes of the Board. On 9 July 1952: "It was moved and unanimously adopted that the regular August meeting is to be held on the third Wednesday at the home of Carl Holvick in Menlo Park. This meeting is to represent the first of an anticipated several during the year wherein the Board of Directors' meetings will be open to the general membership for the purpose of directly and personally acquainting the membership with the business of the Board of Directors". The minutes of the meeting of 20 August 1952 reported: "It is to be noted that it was one of the most successful gatherings based upon common understanding and constructive achievement".

The Club was saddened by the death of Nick Carter.

John Coss

Fellowship, under the chairmanship of John Coss, was spectacular. The atmosphere of the Club moved uphill again. Programs, with a fine committee headed by Dave Wight, were maintained at an excellent level. Two months into the new year the meeting place was moved to Romeo's Restaurant in San Carlos, providing a new stability of meeting place, good food and better accoustics. The Club reached 100% as a contributor to the Rotary Foundation, which meant that its contributions had totaled to \$10.00 per member. Jack Daley proposed a barrel in which canned foods be deposited at each meeting for distribution to needy families at Thanksgiving. This was enthusiastically supported. The club assemblies in conjunction with the Board meetings were repeated and continued knitting the membership and furthered understanding of administrative policies. Noel Pennington and Arthur Farnham were hosts to two of these meetings in their own homes. A quiet, almost secret, project was adopted, coordinated by George Seeley, to sponsor teen age boys who had been in trouble. With no publicity these boys were taken to ball games, to family meals, on fishing trips, and to other activities in which they could be given wholesome adult male companionship. They were also brought to club meetings and some were given employment. The Club sustained its sponsorship of its camperships, scout examinations, scholarships and other standard projects.

The year ended with a great comeback in the spirit, unity, and purpose of the Club. In recognition of this resurgence, the KEYWAY editorialized in its last issue of the year: "In electing new officers an organization says, in effect, that they feel the NEW seems to hold more promise of fulfillment of the membership's ideas than the OLD. That may well be the case. BUT, (We wish our typewriter had bigger capitals for that 'BUT') YOU, Mr. Non-Officer, are the Gent who can bring that ideal to its conclusion. When you elected these new officers you told them and the Club that YOU wanted them to guide the destinies of the Club, YOUR CLUB, for the coming year. You did a fine job of selecting your officers. You picked six loyal, hard-working, imaginative men and retained a fine Past President for his automatic term. In being installed tomorrow night they - Fred, Armand, Johnny, Dave, John, Jack and Carl - are accepting the obligation to work hard for you. You may rest assured that they, as earlier boards before them, will work hard. Will they do a good job? Yes, they will. How good a job they do, however, is not for them to decide. It doesn't really matter how hard they try, how zealously they work, how imaginatively they plan. How good a job they do, Friend, depends on YOU. They need a few weapons that only YOU can give them to do a bang-up job. Those weapons are: YOUR loyalty, YOUR abiding by majority vote, YOUR doing well any assignments large or small they may delegate to you, YOUR attendance, YOUR comments (TO your officers, not ABOUT them), YOUR prevention of small cliques within the Club. Do you want a good club? ONLY YOU can provide it. If you do, your state of officers will administer it for you".

Fred Schroeder, following two years as secretary, was the first president who had not been a charter member. He had served on the Board through the previous terms in which the difficulties and the remedies described earlier had occurred. His year shows more than any before it the profound influence on each administration of decisions and of committee studies in the previous administrations, for one will see bearing fruit much which was prepared before and will see much of this year's planning ripen in subsequent administrations.

Fred brought a genial but formal dignity to the weekly meetings. His warm smile and his firm control were equally manifest, creating that high calibre of presiding which was his own hallmark. The Club remained a popular make-up for Rotarians from neighboring areas. It became active in the new Peninsula Council of Rotary Clubs. The KEYWAY, edited by Jim Hamilton, added several new features. The club roster, giving members' home and business addresses and telephone numbers and wives' names was printed on the back, as were the names of the officers and principal committee chairmen. The masthead was reduced in size, freeing more space for the body of the bulletin. Biographies of more than half of the members appeared as second pages of the KEYWAY, increasing our knowledge of one another. This project of biographies of all the members, we are embarrassed to note, was not completed. Bill Peppard's program committee sustained a high level of interest at the weekly meetings. Once a month an Explorer and a Scout from Troop 153 were guests of the Club at the regular meetings. The Club Assemblies in the homes of members were continued. Fellowship under Milt Lauterwasser was well organized and at a high level. In this year the Club obtained a post office box and donated a present to the new Rotary Club of Daly City on its charter presentation. A South Peninsula joint Rotary meeting under the chair of Menlo Park was held in conjunction with the Rotary Clubs of Los Altos, Sunnyvale, Mountain View, Redwood City and Palo Alto.

This was also an active year in community service. The Mid-Peninsula Fair planned in the previous year was launched. Lou Goss was in charge of tickets and the queen competition, John Rehe of manpower, and Joe Brown of exhibits. By placing second to the Optimists in the queen contest we were awarded second choice of concessions. Almost all of our members became hoarse hawking the joys of throwing a pingpong ball into a goldfish bowl. This successful project early in the administration's year led both to an affluence to which the Club was unaccustomed and also to a greater feeling of fellowship within the Club. We learned again what every club has to re-learn every so often, that a project in which the members work together brings closeness as well as success. In the meanwhile, under Wally Truce, the sponsorship of the Hi-Y chapter at Carlmont High School was undertaken. John Daley sparked a new project of creating a blood-bank account for the Club. The Peninsula Symphony, camperships, and the precamp scout examinations were supported as before. However, the scout examination was changed in its basis. Each Scout was charged one dollar for the examination, the proceeds being directly returned to Troop 153 and to the Girl Scout Council for camperships. Under the guidance of George Seeiey a driver safetly program was instituted at Carlmont High School. Athletic trophies were awarded to outstanding Carlmont athletes. President Fred had heard of a group of Carlmont students who were planning a bicycle trip through Europe. He appointed a committee with himself as chairman to explore ways in which these youngsters might be given employment so that they could finance their own venture. San Mateo County had just opened a new home for children whose parents were in trouble, personal or legal. A committee under Carl Holvick was appointed to explore paving a playground for this home. Another committee under Jack Daley and Jim Hamilton was appointed to meet with County Health Director, Dr. Harold Chope, to explore ways the Club could be of service to the children in this home.

With this great resurgence of spirit, the Club had regained its strength in club service and in community service. International service and vocational service were expressed only in the programs at luncheon meetings. The year ended with a much revitalized membership, much growth in Rotary feeling, no net growth in membership numbers.

Armand Johnson's deep, soft-but-powerful voice, his ready smile, and his easy-going control were the new trademarks of our meetings. While the management and the name of our meeting place changed from Romeo's to the Villa Antone to the Dog Platter the large number of visitors remained unabated. Bob Titus rapidly proved himself one of our long line of devoted program committee chairmen, giving us a fine diversity of material at the weekly meetings. The KEYWAY, edited by Paul Beale, had much sparkle and humor while remaining a fund of information. Club service remained on an even keel with many new members brought in but an unusually large number of resignations counter-balancing the gain in size. Evening Club Assemblies in the homes of members continued. The Annual Picnic at Irv Kesterson's estate in Atherton was held jointly with the Redwood City Club. Governor Bake Bacon asked the Club to host a multiclub dinner in honor of Rotary International Director Ollie Oberg of Sydney, Australia. This affair was held ll February at the Chukker in San Mateo with about four hundred present from the Rotary Clubs in the Peninsula Council. Past President Fred Schroeder who was chairman of this affair functioned ably as Master of Ceremonies.

In community affairs the Club continued its campership, scout examinations, Troop 153 sponsorship, Peninsula Symphony contribution, and Thanksgiving food barrel programs. It launched early into the Peninsula Community Fair, winning first place with the assistance of its Fair Queen, Sharon Nelson. Lou Goss again was in charge of ticket sales and John Rehe of manpower. By winning in sales competition we had our choice of concessions - electing to repeat on the pingpong balls into goldfish bowls and also to man another booth with a dime-toss into glassware. All members served one or more shifts in each booth, developing hoarse voices and a substantial club treasury. Some of the funds thus raised were utilized for a paved playground for the San Mateo County Receiving Home, under the supervision of Carl Holvick. After a tour through the Home, as the program for one of our meetings, the Club began to send two members to the Home each Saturday on a volunteer basis. These men served by working directly with the kids on any trip or tour which was appropriate for that day. Fred Schroeder proposed the sponsorship of the Bel Angels, a teen-aged hot rod club. The project was adopted.

Our first real project in international service was launched. The Highland Cyclists, who had been assisted in obtaining jobs during the previous year, were joined by some Carlmont girls and faculty members. They began their tour through the East and then through Europe. Each Rotary Club along their route received a letter informing them when the cyclists would arrive. These letters, sent by a committee consisting largely of Fred Schroeder, brought about a Rotary contact at almost each stop. The youths were hosted by Rotary Clubs and often in Rotary homes as well as staying in the youth hostels along their path. This project in international contacts led to our first feeling of the scope of worldwide Rotary.

In summary, Armand's year ended with a continued high level of fellowship and service and with a major step taken along the international avenue.

Quick with the quip, articulate, perceptive, as he was, Jim also was not averse to a little "ham", "corn-ball". "slapstick." But he was uncompromising with rules and regulations, and would "stick to his guns" and the "letter of the law" to protect the principals governing "Classifications", for example, At once genial and serious Jim felt no problem was too large or too small as long as it pertained to improving our Rotary Club. During this administration there was action all the time.

By 1955 - '56, the Rotary Club of San Carlos had survived its birth, adolescence and youth, and while still young and vibrant, certain growing pains of early years gave way to the first blush of satisfied middle-age and occasional stabs of contentment, security and success. Jim realized that the wonderful concept of Rotary must be nurtured if the Club was to prosper. During his administration new members taken in exceeded our resignations, and the net gain was the greatest in any one year. Membership was still selective and carefully screened, with Lou Goss's Indoctrination Committee working overtime, and our growth from 37 to 48 members put new life and blood into the Club. Eternal vigilance, meetings, fireside meetings, extra curricular lunches, special Board meetings to iron out problems of the day were more and more frequent.

During this regime attendance was boosted by the fining of the President, two dollars for each 100% month. This created much mirth and helped maintain the traditionally good attendance of the Club. The ladies' day lunches were numerous this year, with the ladies as guests for regular programs. Periodic letters were sent to the members concerning the progress of the Club. At each meeting one committee was asked to report to the Club concerning its activities. All committees had met and had rendered written reports by the first day of the fiscal year. The rapid growth of the Club was enhanced by a new committee whose function it was to pass prospective new members around to old members for hospitality purposes. This committee, under the co-chairman-ship of Milt Lauterwasser and Wally Truce, created an excellent assimilation of the new members. Several programs on controversial subjects such as fining by rotation rather than by committee were presented to the Club in the form of debates, followed by club vote. In this manner duscussion was more or less limited to those who had studied the problems prior to talking. Among the high spots of the programs may be listed the return of the Highland Cyclists and their report to the Club, and the appearance of Past International President Almon Roth to induct his son, Bill into the Club.

The Villa Antone changed names to the Dog Platter and was remodeled. The new room was unsuitable. On I January 1956 the Club moved its meeting place to its present quarters at the Villa Chartier.

The Peninsula Council of Rotary Clubs rotates its presidency and secretary geographically. It was the turn, therefore, of Jim Hamilton and Bill Peppard to fill these offices in addition to their respective offices in the Rotary Club of San Carlos.

The customary projects in community service were continued: camperships; scholarships; subscriptions of the ROTARIAN for schools, libraries and hospitals; examination of boy and girl scouts prior to camp with the proceeds returned to the examined groups for camperships. A new project, conceived by Paul Sampson, came into being, namely the distribution of industrial scraps to the schools, as raw materials in manual training programs. Noel Pennington proposed and was made chairman of a new project at Crystal Springs Home (old people's home) for collection and distribution of books from our members. This project was a moderate success. A baseball team of Rotarians provided fellowship, fun, and the cellar of the league. John Giustetto and Lou Goss were jointly the leaders of this venture. Pop Burton was appointed representative to Troop 153. The program of bringing high school guests was expanded by having each student be our guest for four consecutive meetings. At the end of the year the High School Rotarians put on the entire weekly meeting. A joint meeting with the Kiwanis Club, co-chairmaned by Henry Nissen of the Kiwanis Club and by Jim Hamilton, but hosted by the Rotary Club had Past District Governor Wally Myers as speaker. Under the leadership of Fred Schroeder a safety check of automobiles in the Redwood City - San Carlos area was conducted jointly with the Redwood City Lion's Club.

In the international field the Club collected and sent stamps, sorted and packaged by Paul Werdern, to the Rotary Club of Dublin, Ireland. Letters were written by Ray Mardon to all other San Carlos clubs in the world; the answers which came in were disappointing. On 28 December, all the clubs in the Southern half of the district assembled to honor and to hear International President, A.Z. Baker. Following the success last year of the Highland Cyclists, an organization called TOCS (Travel Opportunities for Carlmont Students) was given our financial support.

Our vocational service program found itself this year. Mell Schroeder was the overall chairman, assisted by Steve Nogleberg of Redwood City and Jim Powers of Menlo Park, inputting on a joint meeting of the three clubs. Each Rotarian's competitor was his guest. Joe Gabriel, Past District Governor and founder of the Redwood City and Menlo Park Clubs, was the speaker to this assembly of more than two hundred. A vocational guidance committee consisting of Dave Wight, Chairman, and Paul Beale and Dave Crane organized a list of several hundred vocations which Carlmont students might see in action.

So ended a year of great growth in numbers of members, with a fine attendance and performance record. The Club remained in fine condition and spirit.

The year progressed, therefore, in fine style with many projects acheived with spirit and fellowship at a high level.

The ever genial Bill Peppard was perhaps the smoothest organizer of our presidents. His meetings were faultless, always miraculously on time. His major meetings committees matched him. A humorous informative KEYWAY put out by Don Lind changed the format to legal length paper; many issues still required a second page. Programs under Art Farnham remained diversified and interesting, while fellowship thrived under John Tenvold's chairmanship. Great stress was made upon controlling early leaving. The room was rearranged so that the speaker's table was near the door, an endeavor to discourage early leaving by making it conspicuous. The news analyst, Henry Hughes, performed with less bias than his stand-in, Wally Truce. The first fashion show produced by the wives of members was the program for a ladies' day lunch. Many programs were put on both by high school and by grammar school students. One of the meetings was a flight to Reno arranged by Art Farnham. A joint meeting with Kiwanis was held. A leave of absence was granted to Frank Wright. And, toward the end of the year, the Club collaborated in financing and in planning a dinner at the District Conference held in San Jose. Bill Peppard was a speaker at that conference.

The community activities of the Club were many and were diversified. The scout examinations, camperships, scholarships and support for the Receiving Home continued as they had in the past few years. A new project, under the chairmanship of Wally Truce and with Bud Schuetz, Hal Larsen and George Greenleaf supporting, worked in support of San Carlos' clean up committee. Elmer Martin and Jim Hamilton were delegated to explore the formation of a Little League in town. They participated in the overall committee for San Carlos, and recommended that the Rotary Club assist in building a little league park in new Arundel Park; and that the Club do not sponsor a team, since there was no shortage of organizations willing to underwrite that phase of the program. The Club erected a backstop and supplied bases.

Only one project of significance in international service was launched. This consisted of hosting nine young men from New Zealand traveling through the United States under a ROTA (Rotary Overseas Travel Association) sponsorship. These lads were entertained at homes of members and provided a meeting program at which Redwood City was our guest club and which was taped and sent back to the New Zealand Rotary Clubs with the ROTA group. On one evening all of these visitors were entertained at a potluck dinner at Bill Peppard's home.

So ended a year of moderate growth and of fine consolidation of recent gains.

Always ready with the quip, debonaire at all times, never at a loss, always in command, big Dave Neufeld brought a new high of hilarity to the regular meetings. With his fine command of humor, early leaving was controlled to a record low, for he had the gall to fine the early-leaver and the charm to make it palatable. This year saw the fining committee replace the rotating finemaster. Dues and the Initiation Fee were each raised, by amendment of the bylaws, to forty dollars. The KEYWAY adopted a new masthead, designed by Henry Hughes, portraying an aerial view of the San Carlos Area with the shadow of the Rotary Wheel rolling across it. Lou Goss was appointed by the Board to replace Bill Hornyak who resigned early in the year. This was the first time in the Club's history that the provisions for replacing a Director were invoked and the only time a past president served on the Board after his automatic term. Jim Folger maintained the traditionally fine level of the club programs, and Waldo Perry was outstanding as fellowship chairman. Bill Peppard was asked to serve as Special Representative of District Governor Lloyd Hayes to survey the Belmont area as a potential site for a new club. Jim Hamilton was proposed to the District Nominating Committee as a candidate for District Governor for the year 1959-1960. His nomination was announced to the Club by Governer Lloyd Hayes in January 1959. The outstanding features of the year were the many social functions. Of these, the first was a fashion show put on by the Rotary Annes. In February, the tenth anniversary party of the Club was held, following a cocktail party jointly hosted by Dave Neufeld and Jim Hamilton. Bill Roth was chairman of this party to which all former members of the Club were invited, with a large reunion resulting. A feature of this anniversary party was the presentation of new badges labeling the remaining charter members as such.

Later in the year, Bill Peppard reported to Governor Lloyd Hayes that the Belmont area was suitable for the creation of a new club. This resulted in changing the territory of the Rotary Club of San Carlos to "San Carlos and its surrounding territory", ceding "Belmont and its surrounding territory" to the new Provisional Rotary Club of Belmont. The Rotary Club of San Carlos was host of a luncheon at the District Conference at the Flamingo in Santa Rosa, April 1959. There it presented as entertainment the entire Carlmont A Capella Chorus. The school bus provided transportation; the Club provided the food.

In community service, the traditional camperships, scout examinations, sponsorship of Troop 153 with Pop Burton as institutional representative, scholarships, donation to the Peninsula Symphony Orchestra, and YMCA building fund donations were continued. The Receiving Home project continued unchanged. In addition, the Club joined the Redwood City Club in participating in a hole-in-one tournament at the SanWood Driving Range. This project netted the youth service fund a substantial amount. Lou Goss and Milt Lauterwasser were appointed to represent the Club on the new Parks and Recreation Committee of San Carlos. The Club received a letter from the Rotary Club of San Carlos, Brazil, requesting an exchange of letters between the sons of members. This was referred to members with teen-aged sons and was carried out, with John Russell's son the chief correspondent. Vocational service was expressed largely in regular meeting programs.

On 19 June 1959, the Provisional Rotary Club of Belmont became the Rotary Club of Belmont. With this charter, several of the fine members of the Club left, so that the membership was diminished in numbers despite the fact that more new members were brought in than were lost through routine resignations. In general it was a year of great activity, particularly in the field of club service.

Tall, handsome in the President Eisenhower style, crisp, with a soft but carrying bass voice, John Russell presided with gently humorous dignity. He was somewhat a perfectionist, his meetings overflowing with fellowship but retaining their technical excellence. In his year, and under his untiring guidance, the Club met several challenges. The first was to fill the gaps left by the resignation of the charter members of the Belmont Club. The second was to retain energy for service while putting on two district functions. These challenges were overcome with no injury to the spirit of the Club. His program chairmen seemed to encounter personal problems which took them away from their Rotary duties: Paul Beale resigned because of a press of business. He was succeeded by Cliff Christison who had to withdraw because of extra duties attendant to the merger of his bank. Gary Goss filled out the term as program chairman with excellence and devotion.

The first meeting of the Board granted Jim Hamilton's request to be reclassified as Senior Active. Jim, thus became the first of the charter members of the Club to be awarded this status. At that first meeting also, the plans were laid for the Charter presentation Dinner of the Belmont Club. Fred Schroeder was appointed general chairman, with Bill Peppard Master of Ceremonies, John Geddis in charge of decorations, John Russell officiating as Host Club President, and assisted by Art Stadler of Menlo Park in charge of publicity and Howard Imus of Redwood City directing registration. Past Governor Wally Myers deliverd the Charter Address, while immediate Past Governor Lloyd Hayes presented the Charter. This meeting, attended by about four hundred Rotarians and guests, was held on 31 July 1960, only a few weeks after the beginning of the year.

As taken of his zeal for excellence of performance, John presented a copy of the Manual of Procedure to each member of his Board of Directors. One of the first problems encountered by this Board was the discovery that although ten dollars of the initiation fee of each new member of the Club had been allocated to the Rotary Foundation, successive treasurers had never been instructed to mail the checks to Rotary International. So the funds rested in the treasury, appropriated but not sent. This necessitated research into the books and final submission of an appropriate sum to the Rotary Foundation. The Club, thereupon, was awarded a 200% certificate by the Rotary Foundation.

In September, John wrote a letter in the name of the Club, to be included in the book of testimonials to be presented to Past Governor Joe Gabriel at a testimonial dinner on the occasion of his 35th year in Rotary. Paul Sempson was granted Senior Active status. A joint meeting with the Rotary Club of Belmont was held under the co-chairmanship of George Watts of San Carlos and Jack Daley of Belmont. The Club also attended a joint meeting, as guests of Redwood City, in which Mayor Christopher of San Francisco was the speaker.

The major effort of the Club in the avenue of Club Service, however, was the coordination of the other San Mateo County clubs in putting on the District Conference in April at the Villa Hotel and at the San Mateo County Fiesta Grounds. Paul Sampson was overall Conference Chairman. He worked in close liason with John Russell as Host Club President and with George Greenleaf as Conference Secretary-Treasurer. The Rotary Annes, led by Pat Russell, prepared entertainment for the ladies. Almost the entire membership of Club was engaged in some phase of Conference production as the Club gave magnificent support to its own District Governor.

In the meanwhile the Club did not become idle in service. The underwriting of the Receiving Home with two members attending each Saturday was continued. The scout exams, sponsorship of Troop 153, scholarships, camperships and other traditional programs in youth service were continued unabated. The High School Rotarian program was expanded to two students each month. A new sponsorship of a community theater production was undertaken. Paul Werdern conducted a survey of the needs of the Crystal Springs Home. The Hole-in-one Tournament with Redwood City was dropped, to the relief of both clubs, who felt it required an output greater than its merit. In Vocational Service a new project, led by Bill Carter, arose. This was the sponsorship of a Junior Achievement chapter at Carlmont High School. The Competitor Relations dinner was again produced. In International Service, besides reaching the status of 200% Club in Rotary Foundation contributions, the V.I.S.A. program was also entered by having several members receive students from other lands as guests in their homes.

With all of these activities and accomplishments, the high spot of the year came at the Installation Dinner Dance at the end of the year. At that time Rotary International President Harold T. Thomas and his wife, Mae, were the guests of the Club. Harold presented the past president's pin to President John and pinned the president's pin in the lapel of his successor. And so closed a year of much activity and productivity.

George Greenleaf's thatch of silver-gray hair shone like the baton of an orchestra leader as he presided with his own particular brand of vivacity. George maintained a firm control over the meeting, disguised by his gentle manner. In his year, and spurred on by the lag in Rotary Foundation contributions corrected in the previous year, an amendment to the bylaws was passed which required the treasurer to submit ten dollars to the Foundation immediately upon receipt of the initiation fee of a new member. A pocket roster of the Club containing a list of the open classifications in San Carlos was prepared and issued to the members as a spur to growth. The Club formed a bowling team to enter the Statewide Rotary Bowling Tournament in San Jose. This team, consisting of Art Farnham, Walt Seiler, Bob Dunn, Don Lind and Chuck Baker did not set the bowling world on fire but it did provide good fellowship and a topic of interest. Many members of the Club traveled to Sebastopol to attend a dinner in honor of International President Edd McLaughlin of Texas and of International Secretary, George Means. Among the outstanding programs of the year were a trip to the P. G. and E. Atomic Power Plant in Pleasanton and a club trip to Candlestick Park to a Giants baseball game.

The traditional community and youth services were carried through again during this administration. The Club underwrote a performance of the Community Players and a recital of the Don Cossack Choir. It re-learned that fund raising projects primarily built upon the sale of tickets do not do outstandingly well in the Rotary Club of San Carlos. At the request of the Salvation Army a bicycle was purchased and donated to an underprivileged child. In the meanwhile, stimulated by George's great interest in international affairs, the Club became active in the V.I.S.A. program, with many international students invited to Club meetings, to other Club functions, and to members' homes. A student was underwritten to visit a European country under the Experiment for International living. During the two weeks preceeding the International Convention in Tokyo many clubs moved their regular meeting to the Hilton Inn at the San Francisco International Airport in order to proffer hospitality to Rotarians and their families en route to Tokyo. The Rotary Club of San Carlos was one of these. After this project, three members of the Club attended the Tokyo Convention: George Greenleaf, Arthur Farnham and Jim Hamilton, all bringing back to the Club tall tales of their adventures. The principal accomplishment in vocational service this year was the continued sponsorship of a Junior Achievement Chapter. One meeting was designated as Secretaries' Day. At this meeting each member brought his secretary as his guest. The secretaries provided the program mostly in terms of brief "secrets" about the boss. This hilarious meeting provided much good fellowship and also introduced many people who had known each other merely as voices.

The year ended, one of much service in the community and international avenues, with a fine level of fellow-ship and no appreciable change in club size. George's own summary, in a letter to the Historian was, "....a relatively undramatic year in major achievements, but a congenial and friendly spirit continued to grow in the San Carlos Club during the year...."

Never has there been a presiding officer who could chide a club with such ingenuous forthrightness. Don Lind's meetings were merry, well timed, full of fun but also full of purpose. His tall, slender, youthful appearance belied his savoir faire and his uncanny ability to call a spade a palatable shovel. Carnations, donated by John Geddis, were pinned on the lapels of all persons attending the meetings, as a hospitality gesture. Programs, under Dud Holman, maintained the usually high level of interest and diversity. John Russell's KEYWAY achieved a great amount of information in an almost telegraphic style. Fellowship echoed Bob Johnson's booming voice and personality. Attendance, which had fallen off in the previous few years, was stressed; a great improvement showed the benefits of such emphasis. Several meetings were held with the members of the Belmont Club in an endeavor to assist the younger club to overcome difficulties in getting service programs under way. This was the major club service objective of the San Carlos Club for the year. The Club, however, was also charged with the responsibility of conducting the closing dinner at the District Conference at Santa Rosa and of creating a skit "debunking" Governor Norm DeLaittre. George Greenleaf wrote the lyric of a song taped by the Carlmont A Capella Choir. A cast of imaginative characters including Gary Goss, Travis Jackson, Bob White, Don Lind, Art Farnham, George Watts, Bill Peppard and Wes Rusk played the life of Norm in pantomine to the background of the tape.

Again, the community services contained the traditional list which has been repeated in several earlier chapters. In addition, one hundred dollars were contributed each to the YMCA building fund and to the Salvation Army for a needy family. The team sponsored by the Rotary Club in the Police Athletic League ranked high in its conference. In international service the committee undertook writing to each new Rotary Club outside of the United States. These letters evoked some fine answers. Bill Peppard and Trav Jackson, after much study, gave a fine program on "The Middle East Muddle". An orthopedic drill was purchased for St. Luke's International Hospital in Tokyo and was presented through the Rotary Club of Tokyo, accompanied by a tape of the meeting of the Rotary Club of San Carlos. The Competitor Relations lunch, planned by Waldo Perry and John Geddis, was also a joint meeting with the San Carlos Optimist Club. The Secretaries' Lunch became a club tradition providing fine fellowship, under the gavel of Bob Johnson. The Occupational Information committee was reactivated.

Don's own summary of his year expresses particular pleasure with the activities of the International Service Committee. Don, himself, added a new dimension to the High School Rotarian program by writing a letter of summary at the end of his year to each of the boys in this program.

John Tenvold took over the reins of a club which had not had a successful fund-raising project in several years. John, with his studious approach and his fine ability as an organizer, set about attempting to rectify this situation. The regular meetings proceeded with polish, augmented by a strong program committee headed by Walt Griffin, warm fellowship guided by Bill Peppard, and an entertaining, informative KEYWAY edited by Dud Holman. The KEYWAY changed from white to many colors. A new projects committee, headed by Lou Goss and composed of all past presidents, met frequently. The Club bell, which had remained unmarked, was cleaned, polished, and engraved with the name and the charter date of the club. A committee was appointed to design new flags to give to visiting Rotarians. A fire at the Villa Chartier left the Club homeless early in the administration. The Club met temporarily at the Gold Platter, after a few uncomfortable meetings at the Lanai, until the Villa Chartier was reopened on 2 November 1962. A fine joint meeting with the San Carlos Lions Club highlighted the Fall programs. Members of the Club made three trips to Rotary activities. In September, twelve members drove to Healdsburg to join the annual Rotary Canoe Trip to Guerneville. This was the second year of participation in this activity, but the first in which San Carlos members outnumbered those from the Host Club. Seventeen members flew to the Vacaville Rotary Fly-in. Many members and their ladies also attended the Charter Dinner for the Rotary Club of Pacifica. San Carlos provided the Song Leader, Trav Jackson, and the Planist, Art Farnham; it also made a donation to the new club. President John, in encouraging the Club to increase activity, often wrote his own messages in the KEYWAY. We repeat one of these: "The Christmas Tree Pick-up project was somewhat less than a roaring success, but the willingness and participation of the Club was terrific. It shows we can get behind a project, and our next project will be developed with more long range planning so that the Club spirit will pay off." A placard depicting the activities of the Club was prepared and displayed at the District Conference in Palo Alto in April 1963.

The traditional community and youth services were continued. In addition, there was a splurge of new services, most of which were screened through Lou Goss's New Projects Committee. Ron Perry headed a committee which distributed quarter cards to business establishments, encouraging participation in the Bay Area K.O. Polio Campaign. Christmas orders through Bob Johnson's gift catalogue netted the coffers a modest profit. Ron Perry and Dave Neufeld headed a committee to pick up Christmas trees early in January. Although this project was fun and utilized the services of many members it was not much of a financial success. The Belmont Club joined in serving the Receiving Home with a ratio of one Belmonter to two San Carlans. The Police Athletic League team was again sponsored. The Board pledged one thousand dollars to the YMCA Building Funds, half in the present year and half in the next.

The year ended, in community service, with a Junktique Auction engineered and coordinated by Art Farnham. This project employed the services of almost all of the members in one or several phases. It was begun by collecting usable but unwanted objects from the attics of members and their friends and storing them in a warehouse lent by Bill Carter. Meanwhile the International Service Committee, headed by Don Lind, wrote to Rotary Clubs in many lands requesting gifts and promising to recompense the donor club by check or by donation to the Rotary Foundation in the name of the donor club. The project itself was kicked off by adjourning a meeting to the warehouse, where a publicity picture was taken. This was later reproduced in the ROTARIAN with the caption: "Give a man a lampshade and sooner or later he'll put it on his head, as these Rotarians in San Carlos, Calif., are proving. They are surrounded by items they collected for a "Junktique" auction, held to benefit their Club's youth-service program. Items for the sale came from local attics, businesses, and Clubs in other countries with whom the Club has contact". This project was an outstanding success, not only in revenue but also in revitalizing the spirit of the Club.

No new ventures in vocational service were undertaken, but the Junior Achievement, Competitor's Lunch, and the Secretaries Lunch were again successful. In international service the correspondence mentioned above was productive, obtaining more than forty packages for the auction and leading to some further exchanges of correspondence. Upon receipt of notification of our contributing five dollars in their name, a Rotary Club in South Africa wrote to us that they had been stimulated to raise funds to bring their own contribution from 100 to 400%. Our own contribution reached the 300% mark.

Letters to new Rotary Clubs all over the world continued to be sent out. Funds were furnished to send the head of DATA INTERNATIONAL to address the Rotary Club of Mexico City. This was arranged jointly between the two Rotary Clubs. Ten subscriptions to REVISTA ROTARIA, the Rotary Magazine in Spanish, were distributed to appropriate institutions. The Club supported the V.I.S.A. program of San Mateo County Rotary Clubs in staging an International Field Day.

So the year ended with greatly revitalized production in both community and international services and with a perplexing reduction in the size of the Club. Part of John's summary of this year reads: "The potential of the Rotary Club of San Carlos was clearly demonstrated during this administration......the active participation of the Rotarians themselves".

George Moore assumed the leadership of a club ready for an upswing. He presided over the weekly and Board meetings with vigor and with purpose. While fellowship and banter rapidly rose to the club's traditional levels, he never permitted them to get out of hand. His meetings were crisp. He stressed promptness. Toward the end of the year, as the Junktique Auction approached, he initiated the custom of having a letter read each week from one of the international clubs which had made a contribution to the auction. A toast was then offered to that club. Many Club Service activities kept the members busy. In the fall, the annual barbecue became a family affair and moved to Rancho Neufeld. Later fall activities were a trip to Candlestick Park and an evening boat ride to Jack London Square in Oakland. The annual Christmas party included not only our own families but also those of the Rotary Club of Belmont. Those who attended the sixteenth annual dinner dance, held at the Hillsdale Inn, laughed heartily at the satire of the history of Rotary given by Berkeley Club President, Cliff Dochterman, Governor Stan McCaffrey, the guest of honor, was presented a scrapbook for his birthday upon that occasion. The Junktique preview ladies' luncheon featured some professional models from a womens' clothing firm in San Carlos, - and also Gary Goss. Good representation from the club swelled the rosters of two activities of other Rotary Clubs, the Healdshurg -Guerneville Canoe Trip and the Vacaville Fly-In. The year ended with the annual Installation Dinner Dance at which a combined debunking of President George and inbunking of Mell Schroeder uncovered some fine new dramatic talent featuring Sai Campagna and Ray Stimson and many others. District Governor Nominee George Starbird was the club's guest at that affair,

In community service, the club remained principally with the traditional activities which have been previously listed. Pop Burton's resignation as our representative to Boy Scout Troop 153 led to the appointment of Don Thorn to fill that important post. An increase to 500% in the club's Rotary Foundation contribution was made possible by a special fund-by-fine program. The books and bucks contribution by the club to the Nehru Memorial Library proved disappointing both in the amounts gathered and also in the small number of members who participated. International packages came from many parts of the world to increase the coffers of the Junktique Auction. Vocational service remained, as in our past years, the avenue of least expression.

The year was generally one of growth in activity and in size, well summarized by President George. himself, in his report, "My term of office was most gratifying and was an experience that I will always treasure. If the club profited in proportion to what I personally gained, then it was indeed a good year." The Historian feels he may safely speak for the club in echoing to George, "It was, indeed".

Mell Schroeder, our first president with Senior Active membership, provided one of the great surprises of San Carlos Rotary history. His high-pitched, low-volume voice, which at the beginning of the year barely filled the room with the aid of a microphone, developed stentorian qualities whereby at the end of the year, with no electronic aid, he was in thorough command even of the far corners. His medium stature and slender body and genial smile, suggesting one of the Dutch burghers in a Rembrandt painting, belied a forcefulness, humor, and singleness of purpose which rendered his meetings always dynamic and interesting. Problems which could have reached major proportions were prevented from doing so because Mell never was reluctant to bring them forthrightly before the membership. He did not always obtain the answer he sought, but he always obtained a higher solution, that of having the problem thoroughly aired and consequently reduced to insignificance. The fellowship of the club remained at its traditional high level. The programs were diversified and interesting under Phil Maslin's chairmanship. Lewis Knight produced an interesting KEYWAY. The KEYWAY, in this year, was mailed to the homes of the members rather than distributed at the placed at each meeting. It also changed in its format to a folded sheet suitable for that mailing. Extra copies of the KEYWAY were available for visiting Rotarians; these were handed to our visitors as they signed for their make-ups. Another innovation of Mell's was that when any international package was raffled off the country of its origin was honored by having the flag of that country displayed and placed on the podium. The flags of visiting Rotarians from other lands also were displayed and were so placed.

Special seating once a month was accorded to those members who had birthdays in that month. Each was honored with a cupcake sporting a single candle. Another innovation was that with the induction of each new member that member's wife was present as the guest of the club to witness the welcoming of her husband. Fireside meetings were revitalized this year, the first one held July 20th to discuss methods of improving the Junktique Auction. These were many and were situated from Los Altos through Hillsborough so that our members could attend a fireside meeting with minimum travel. At each club meeting a different member introduced the visiting Rotarians.

Two innovations came in International Service. The first was that the club held a "Million Dollar Meal" at the Community Church of San Carlos. A "Million Dollar Meal" is one in which the regular \$2,50 is charged for each in attendance and an inexpensive buffet lunch is served. The proceeds are predicated, and were sent, to the Rotary Foundation. The second innovation was the development by Al Fish and Bill Papsco of a Rotary Foundation all-purpose card which could be sent in all formal situations such as the acknowledgement of a birthday, of a holiday, of a special event, of a funeral, of a wedding, etc. These were sold for \$1.00 each. The profit was also predicated to the Rotary Foundation.

The usual club service activities continued with ladies' days, club barbecue in Dave Neufeld's home in Woodside, installation dinner, etc. However, one new feature was added, namely a Phantom Night. This was a night in which the Rotarians and their Rotary-Anns boarded a bus for destinations undisclosed. There they traveled to other communities and enjoyed dining and dancing and returned feeling that this was a social event which should become a standard. The Rotary Club of San Carlos also undertook the hostship, under the chairmanship of Jim Hamilton, of the Statewide Rotary Bowling Tournament. Even though several teams canceled because of a flu epidemic was than in progress, the tournament was a success. All prizes were sent to appropriate clubs, mostly coming from Southern California. The small amount of profit was sent to the Rotary Foundation in the names of the clubs whose teams had had the highest scores. Ceres Schroeder introduced one innovation in the Rotary-Ann program. This was that on one meeting early in the year she requested that the Past District Governor in the club be a speaker to inform the Rotary-Anns as to the serious purposes of Rotary. All present felt that this had been worthwhile.

Mell was desirous that the Club exhibit its interest in both Rotary International and in District 513 affairs. Upon his suggestion the Board and then the Club proposed Jim Hamilton as a candidate for election to the Nominating Committee for Director from Zone I of Rotary International - approximately the western third of the United States. Jim was elected and served on that committee. A resoluation was presented by the Club and submitted to R. I., through approval by the electors at the District Conference, that an enactment be made amending the By-laws of Rotary International and the Standard Club Constitution to the effect that all Senior Active members, whether optional, automatic, or elected, have the same rights and privileges.

The deaths of two of our dearly beloved elder members saddened the Club. Edward R. (Pop) Burton who had so long functioned as our Seargeant-at-Arms died in the fall. In February Persons W. (Joe) Brown died suddenly. A special scholarship fund was created in memoriam of Pop Burton.

On June 23rd and 24th the annual Junktique Auction was held. The location had been shifted from San Carlos High School to Central School. This shift encouraged greater attendance. The proceeds were the largest ever. The auction, as previously, enlisted the participation of almost the entire membership. It was again a great success. The year ended with the In-Bunking of incoming president Ron Perry. Mell Schroeder reminisced of his year stating that he felt, in general, things had proceeded well; but that he had felt two disappointments. One was that we did not establish an Inter-Act Club and the other that the attendance did not show the gain that had been hoped for. Your Historian counters these with the assurance that all presidents find disappointing phases in their year of office, and that in general this was one of the fine years of the Rotary Club of San Carlos.

Ron Perry, tall and lanky, his wavy brown hair bobbing like a cockatoo's crest, presided over the regular meetings with quiet dignity, a gentle ready humor, and with implacable forcefulness when it was called for. He displayed mastery of parliamentary skill when circumstances required it. His meetings were fraught with bouncing fellowship. The KEYWAY, under Editor Chuck Calderhead, was both informative and humorous. Program Chairman Ed Wicher supplied the Club with a broad diversity of interesting speakers. Fellowship, under the able leadership of Bob Shadle, sustained a high level. The most notable impacts of Ron's leadership, however, came in the form of legislative changes in Club administration and in numerical participation of the Club in inter-club activities as well as in its own.

In attendance at the Charter dinner for the new Rotary Club of East San Jose, the Healdsburg-Guerneville cance trip, and the Vacaville fly-in the Rotary Club of San Carlos out-attended all other clubs but the host club. Attendance at the Charter dinner for the new Rotary Club of Mendocino was limited to one representative of the Club who had to appear; he was the principal speaker, Jim Hamilton. Attendance at the District Conference in Santa Rosa was also below the usually high high club average, six members in all being the total representation. The four principal social events: the Barbecue, the Christmas Party, Mystery Night, and the Installation Dinner Dance were well attended and were much enjoyed by those present.

The Club continued in its traditional activities, still sending two members to the Receiving Home each week and again producing a successful Junktique Auction. It did not gain in its standing in Rotary Foundation contributions. It accepted the host-ship of two Swedish girls touring the United States under their home Rotary sponsorship. It took the Japanese Group Study Exchange Team on a tour of Breuners and Lenkurt and to lunch at Central School. The proceeds of the Million Dollar Luncheon were again contributed to the Rotary Foundation. Scholarships, again, were the principal financial effort of the Club, the funds available being increased from \$1200 to \$1600. Of these funds, \$1000 were awarded to Linda DeLucchi, an outstanding student, while the remaining \$600 were carried forward for use by the Pop Burton Student Loan Fund. Other contributions were made to the American Field Service, Community International, the Salvation Army, the San Mateo Receiving Home, and for a radio for the Pediatrics Ward of Sequoia Hospital. The usual subscriptions of the Rotarian were renewed for local schools and hospitals.

Early in the year, the suggestion that the stipend for the Club's representatives to the Rotary International Convention be increased from \$300 to \$500, which had been defeated by the Club last year because our financial status could not cover the raise, was passed. This was postulated under an increase in the annual dues from \$40.00 to \$55.00 to be counter-balanced by a reduction in the maximum of fines. The fines were to be donated in their entirety to the new non-profit corporation which made all contributions tax deductible. With this bylaws change the Club's finances became stable: all club administration was covered by fixed incomes, whereas all income from fines, fund raising projects, and other non-budgetable sources devolved to the corporation to underwrite the charitable works of the Club.

The year, in summary, was one in which the financial footing of the Club was made firmer, in which attendance was less than inspiring, but in which participation and fellowship remained large and productive -- all under devoted, hard-working, and far-sighted leadership.

The 1967-68 Rotary year was a year of change. For years the club had met at the Villa Chartier in San Mateo. It had been an orphan looking for a home. Glen would not accept a gift.

The Club continued its work at the receiving home by sending two of its members each Saturday to take the kids out on some sort of outing.

The year, on balance, was a good year: Junktique emerged as a perennial, event; the Club moved "home" for its Club meetings; it grew in number and in spirit. --All of the above in spite of President Trav's corny jokes and podium decorum.

The theme for Rotary year 1969-70, "Through Attendance we gain Participation; Through Participation we gain Fellowship; Through Fellowship we gain ROTARY". Attendance at the first social event, the Hawaiian Luau barbecue was the best in years. Travis Jackson, Keyway Editor, added to this fellowship with his wit on paper. Chuck Baker's programs were informative and most importantly, very dependable. Tradition was upheld at the annual Guerneville-Healdsburg Canoe Trip, President Gary finished first again (5th or 6th year in a row); John Lewis' navigation skills were largely responsible. Vacaville Fly-In, June 4th, 1970 was well attended by San Carlos, 5 planes and 21 members. District Governor Harold Graves visited August 8, 1969 and attendance by the membership was very good (38 members). Harold, a Baptist Minister, delivered the Rotary Message. During the time that Al McNay was serving his apprenticeship on the Board, he demonstrated his skill as a former PR man, which he was. Rotary had become a hobby with A! and he laid his plans for the year with great care, determined that the principles of Rotary would be fine tuned to every avenue of service.

One of several "Firsts" the Club had this year was a Club Roster with a full page including a picture, birthdate, anniversary, business and home address, phone numbers, hobbies and name of the member's Rotary Ann.

Two other prestige honors come to the Club at the Annual District Conference at Konocti Harbor Inn at Clear Lake, May 18-19, 1979. The Club won the Homer Wood Award which is the World Community Service Award honoring a Rotary Club sponsoring a special project in this area of service. We sponsored a joint project with the San Carlos Elementary Schools which has as its purpose furthering international understanding and friendly relations among the people of seven foreign countries. The project was made possible by a special grant from the Rotary Foundations matching the \$1,000.00 which was given by our club. The project includes an exchange of instructional materials produced by the students of the primary grades in the foreign countries. The materials are to be developed in the fields of Music, Art, Songs and Drama.

Another honor which was received at Konocti was for the "Best Club Bulletin". The KEYWAY won first prize for the best bulletin for Clubs with over 70 members. Ron Smernoff edited the publication and President AI contributed a weekly column "The President's Paragraph". Its contents were "What's Rotary AII About".

Another "first" to give the Club a banner year was the production of a new "Banner". Henry Hughes, a former member of our club was responsible for the layout and design. The banner features a replica of the ship San Carlos, the first ship ever to enter San Francisco bay. Bill Lindeburg designed a new Rotary Paperweight which is given as a souvenir to each of our guest luncheon speakers. It looks very much like a Rotary emblem.

Cliff Brauff began his year as "Commander" of the Rotary Club of San Carlos, greatly inspired by his attendance at the RI Convention in Rome and capitalized on the momentum generated by his predecessor Al McNay. The high level of humor continued and President Cliff was often the brunt of good natured ribbing for his military manner. The weekly programs were maintained at an excellent level of interest under the skillful guidance of Bryant Wright and Frank Richnak. Continuing with Rotary's "Ideal of Service" and International President Bomar's "Let Service Light the Way," Al McNay and Past District Governor George Newlon launched a series of seminars entitled "What Rotary is all about," for the purpose of expanding the knowledge of Rotary to anyone interested, but especially new Rotarians.

The Club's participation in the Rotary Foundation reached a new high under the guidance of Dr. Ron Perry. A special Ladies Day was held in November with guest speaker Richard King from the East Bay District of Rotary. Rivalry with the Belmont Club in Softball is also a highlight, with Gary Goss sparking our team to victory as Paul Kelly, Rotarian from San Mateo, with his Staff of Authority, (a white cane) umpiring from behind the plate. Then there are the evening events with the Rotaryanns. Under the able direction of John Watkins, and Augie Milich, a most enjoyable Dinner-Dance was held at the Green Hills Country Club jointly with the Belmont Rotary Club. An excellent buffet followed no-host cocktails with dancing to the Big Band Music of Johnny Lampson. As a special surprise at this event, Armand Johnson and John Tenvold were awarded Paul Harris Fellowships.

The San Carlos Rotary Club survived one former Marine as President, only to get another in the person of San Carlos' Chief of Police, Owen (Mac) McGuigan. The combination of the administrative experience in police work which Mac brought to play as head of the San Carlos Rotary Club was soon evident, as activity in the club changed as smoothly as the changing of the guard.

Prior to taking over the gavel as President of the San Carlos Rotary Club, President-Elect Mac and his Rotaryann Ricki attended the RI Convention in Sao Paulo, Brazil. Also attending were Bruce and Helene Stewart.

President Mac took command with a smooth but firm manner, delegating duties and spreading the responsibility to his Board of Directors and committee chairmen. The high level of quality of the weekly programs continued under the guidance of Don Whitley and his committee. With Hometown Days rapidly becoming a popular annual event, San Carlos Rotarians again manned a Pancake Breakfast Booth at Burton Park under the able direction of Wagon Bosses Bill Lindeburg and Art Pollock and added \$1,000.00 to the Community Service Fund.

District Governor Bob Rockwell and his Rotaryann were welcomed in October with a tour of the Filoli Estate in Woodside by the Rotaryanns, while Governor Bob spoke to the Club, reviewing Rotary's history back in the early days in Chicago. This event was soon followed by another successful Rotary Foundation program under the direction of Dennis Young. Guest speaker was Sid Berlin. Contributions amounted to \$12,000.00, increasing the Club's Paul Harris Fellows to 29 and sustaining members to 41. The holiday season was again observed with a gala dinner dance at Green Hills Country Club with the Belmont Rotary Club and again all enjoyed the popular Big Band Music of Johnny Lampson.

President McCaffrey asked each president to undertake a special program, a meaningful project, designed to improve international understanding. We undertook not only one, but two such projects. The first was a meeting day program set aside specifically to develop ideas on how Rotary could in fact improve international understanding. Under the coordination of Bryant Wright and Clint Matrisciano, all in attendance at the meeting participated in the development of several excellent ideas. These were passed along to District Governor Rockwell for inclusion in a packet to President McCaffrey. Additionally, we undertook the Youth Exchange Program with our sister club in Woy Woy, Australia.

During the year Mac and the Board were faced with several difficult and unusual situations. They included some contested membership proposals and the discovery of an impostor among us. The imposter, visiting from another country, and pretending to be a member of a major club in that country, was reported to our District Governor, International Director Kutsuris and eventually Rotary International. During Mac's investigation of this situation, the Club was abuzz with talk of the then possible impostor who had visited the homes and businesses of some members. A successful resolution was reached to each and all of these situations, although some will remember the "Year of the Imposter" for a long time to come.

As the year of this administration came to a close, Allison McNay announced that he would be unable to continue as Secretary/Treasurer of the Club. As the call went out to the membership, Dr. Ron Perry volunteered to be Secretary and Gus Liljequist offered to be Treasurer.

Prior to a gala installation of Ron Smernoff at Sharon Heights Golf and Country Club, President Ron and his Rotaryann Brenda attended the Rotary International Convention in Dallas together with Gary and Chrystel Goss. With the traditional "debunking" ceremony of the outgoing president at Sharon Heights, President Mac completed a successful year as president of the Rotary Club of San Carlos, a year in which he can be proud of the successful efforts to promote the "spirit of service" to the community.

Mac has asked that District Governor Rockwell's letter/report on his visit to the Club and his own end of the year message be included as part of this history. His request is being honored and those documents follow.

We were one of 21 clubs in the two-day tournament, and we came away with the second-place trophy. I've never seen so much enthusiasm as when our underdog team beat the favorites. I wish space permitted more comment on this, but suffice to say it was a very happy time for me and my teammates.

As to our goal of increasing membership, our club members did an outstanding job. We didn't just want numbers, but we wanted people who we felt would contribute to the betterment of our Club. I believe we accomplished our objective. During the year, we increased our

membership by 15 to a total of 93. In March, 1986, we had a great Friday meeting. We inducted six young men; Darryl Thom, Eugene Leung, David Baker, Gary Thomas, Paul Watts, and Julio Reyes-Alvarado. In doing so, we also lowered our average age as most of the new members were younger. While on the subject of membership, I asked Ron Perry and Al Hart to reinstitute the Cog Club which had been dormant for a few years.

The purpose for our existence is service to the community and during 1985-1986, I believe our Club continued its history of doing good for others. We had the Dixieland Jazz program, Junktique, and Pancake Breakfast to raise funds. As in the past, we were able to give thousands of dollars to needy people, groups and organizations. These funds were designated and distributed by our Donations and Scholarship Committees. Our ladies started a project of giving bags full or necessities to the needy through the Catholic Social Services. Even with the many donations to needy causes, the Club was able to accumulate, with the financial manipulations of our Treasurer, Don Kinsley, \$31,000.00 in savings toward a long-range charity project.

All members contributed to a fun-filled and service-to-other year. In retrospect, one area stands out, as it entertained us and informed us every week. The *Keyway* which Gailerd Smith and his Committee handled gave all of us a good feeling each Friday. The humorous weekly articles about our members not only were great, but the Club won the District Award for Bulletins.

This was a very fulfilling year for me as President of our outstanding Club of District 513. We had our Silver Anniversary of the world-famous Junktique Auction, chaired by Kevin Holden, and our third year of Dixieland Jamboree which was the final year at Circle Star Theatre due to its renovation.

The year of my presidency was an unusual one, and one filled with a full plate of Rotary activity. At the PETS conference, we were given two charges. First, the Supreme Court had acted on women and Rotary. They must be admitted. Secondly, the original Polio Plus Campaign was launched. The ultimate goal was to raise \$160,000,000 to eradicate Polio throughout the world. San Carlos Rotary was assigned a goal of \$50,000.

Let me discuss women in Rotary first. The idea of allowing women in Rotary was accepted by most and resisted by a few. Those few left the club. If my memory serves me correctly, Judy Brown was the first. Kim Mankins, I believe, was second. The list above provides you with the rest. There were a total of five in 1987-1988. Needless to say, the addition of women made a great club greater, and San Carlos Rotary survived "the ordeal."

Now let's approach Polio Plus. \$50,000 was a large sum to raise, so we thought, for a club our size. I set about to find someone in our club to tackle this immense task. I needed someone who was first, highly respected by the membership, and second, had the time to invest to insure a successful fund-raising campaign. I chose Borue O'Brien and could not have made a better choice. As President of San Carlos Rotary, I made a substantial commitment on my own.

Borue then chose Ray Cook to assist him and they approached the members on a private and individual basis, with confidentiality where requested. We had decided to increase our goal to \$80,000. We far exceeded any imaginable goal. We raised \$156,000. At the time, the District was known as 515 with 64 clubs. We were number one in the District in Polio Plus fund raising. Many thanks to Borue O'Brien, Ray Cook, and the generosity of the club's members.

In 1982, Gailerd Smith and I, in response for a need for a new fundraiser, created the Dixieland Jazz Festival for San Carlos Rotary. In 1987, the club allowed us to expand the involvement from one club to fourteen clubs on the Peninsula and agreed that all net proceeds, for that year only, would go to Polio Plus. We grossed \$70,000 and netted \$30,000 for Polio Plus, a very proud accomplishment for San Carlos and the rest of the participating clubs. As an aside, San Carlos Rotary had a ball working the festival at the Fair Grounds, and the bands all wanted to play at our festival because of the way they were treated.

In my first years in Rotary, little emphasis was placed on Paul Harris Fellows. At some point, Dr. Ron Perry, a distinguished member of our club, took on the project of getting everyone in the club to be a Paul Harris Fellow. In 1987-1988, I am pleased and proud that San Carlos Rotary inducted a record high 28 new Paul Harris Fellows.

Thanks to Ken Olevson, KeyWay Chairperson, we were the recipient of the District Conference award for the best weekly newsletter in medium-sized clubs.

The secret of a successful Rotary Club is new membership. The club was extremely active in this area and nine new members were inducted. Another proud accomplishment of our club.

On a lighter side, we probably hold the record for the first pregnant Rotarian, thanks to Kim Mankins. Probably no records are kept, so it is probably safe to claim the record. Additionally, five new children (not grandchildren) were born to Rotarians. The lowering of the average age of San Carlos Rotarians was finally taking effect.

Sadly, we lost Bill Lindeburg, a truly great Rotarian. It was he who was first chairman of Hometown Days Pancake Breakfast, with Ruth's famous fizz's at the warm-up table. He was a past President and truly an involved Rotarian. He will always be remembered for his commitment to Rotary.

All in all, this was a highly successful, challenging, and fun year for San Carlos Rotary. When the Rotarians were asked to step up to the plate, no one failed to do so. I truly enjoyed my year and am thankful for all the support I received. San Carlos Rotary is truly a great club.

The following goals were set forth for the year: 1. Attack illiteracy; 2. Emphasize international scholarships; 3. Formation of a past presidents council; 4. Put in place a membership development and retention program; 5. Expand the scope of the news bulletin; 6. Emphasis on quality speaker programs; 7. Expansion of two important ongoing programs namely the Jazz Jamboree and the children's X-Mas toy drive; 8. Lay ground work for the "Fun Run".

LITERACY. A liaison was established with the Sequoia District Adult School to increase the functional literacy level of semi-literate in our community. Under the direction of Ben Stolpa as Director of the project, this club has provided materials (magazines, books, etc.), seminar leaders, financial aid and recognition luncheons.

INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS. An accelerated program was established to seek candidates for scholarships by permanent liaison with community colleges, universities, civic leaders, etc. This program has established what appears to be a permanent long-term system that will lead to a flow of scholars. By the endo of the Rotary year, candidates were in process, but final results had not yet resulted.

PAST PRESIDENTS COUNCIL. The council was formed and held meetings as need to deal with general policy matters not under the prevail of any one committee. This means of attacking problems proved invaluable especially in improving attendance at meetings and membership development.

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT. A program was put into place to: Replace attrition loss of an estimated 10% -- Attain membership growth of 4% -- Improve the rate of retention.

KEYWAY . Under editor Alan Rockhold, wider coverage and an improved range of topics and a greater use of photos was used to attract readership. This resulted in the Club receiving the first-place award for clubs in our size category in the District.

PROGRAMS. Speakers were drawn from the press, Hoover Institute, the legal profession and political office holders in particular.

JAZZ JAMBOREE AND CHILDREN'S X-MAS. Jazz Jamboree participation was expanded to include additional S.F. Peninsula clubs and consequently attendance was up over previous years. The Christmas Gifts for abused children under the county care came in well above previous years. Also, funds were now being offered in addition to toys and gifts.

FUN RUN. This fundraising event was in its infancy and under Jon Stocum's direction got off to a solid start and had the groundwork laid for a major event in the future years.

Arlan Young, a ten-year Rotarian with seven years on the Board assumed the presidency of the Club in a "Gala Affair" at the Green Hills Country Club chaired by Judy Brown. President Arlan succeeded the very able and energetic Forbes King.

The Club's biggest problem for the first six weeks of the new Rotary year was, not having a *Keyway* Editor. Fortunately, Terry Wilson was coaxed out of a retirement. As past editor, Terry assumed control without a hitch.

The Club forum on Community Service in late July discussed the Club's ongoing problems with fundraising to support community service efforts. Junktique was discontinued in 1990 due to progressive declining revenues since the late mid-1980's. Dixieland revenues have slowly eroded with time because, quite frankly a sizable minority of our members refuse to support the fundraiser with the most potential.

Chicken's Ball to broaden our fundraising base and public image. Our Club's ten percent increase in fundraising is directly attributable to a broad-based effort of many members working side by side in "elbow grease" fundraisers.

The meetings this year were characterized by excellent variety in programs (Dave Huggins) and such camaraderie that achieving order was always challenging! The introduction of a Club raffle to help subsidize social events while providing "a little action" was very successful.

The social events chaired by Vera Lindeburg and a cast of thousands were very well-attended. The barbecue picnic at Eileen Smith's house was quite raucous, especially since Judy Brown and Brenda Smernoff woman-handled President Arlan into the swimming pool fully dressed! The Halloween costume party at Vera's house was good fun, although most people thought Terry Andreacchi really came as himself. John Watkins organized an excellent Christmas Party at the Palo Alto University Club with a cocktail party at the home of Dave and Mary Ann Huggins. Mystery Nite was a really good time with a bus cocktail party, dinner in Belmont and a live Melodrama. The Installation Dinner, in reality is more a character assassination/roasting of the outgoing President, than installation of the new President. This year's debunking will go down as one of the most elaborate shellacking of an outgoing President in Club history.

Community Service received over \$45,000.00 this year. Scholarships totaled more than \$7,000.00 and Community Donations also were over \$7,000.00 this year. Ben Stolpa and George "Papa" Watts successfully completed the "Glasses for Guatemala" Program with the help of our myopic members.

The Club's treasury was bolstered by \$11,346 from our "Dinner/Auction Fundraiser."

The "Mystery Trip" started with buses conveying participants to the Sunrise Winery at Montebello Ridge. There, good libation was enjoyed by all. The buses then proceeded into the Santa Cruz Mountains for a brief diversionary ride. However, that is where the mystery really began. We soon became lost and ended up on a narrow road going steeply uphill with multiple switchback turns that were unable to accommodate the length of the buses. Besides being lost, we were late for dinner! Fortunately, the drivers were able to back all the way down the hill with its multiple curves. Eventually we arrived at Nicolino's Garden Cafe in Sunnyvale for a nice dinner, complete with live Opera and Neapolitan Singers as entertainment.

Jon was pleased to announce our Club's winning first place for "Large Club Bulletin." Our Keyway editor Bob Barone was offered a contract extension.

Rotary's "Fun Run" and "Pancake Breakfast" at Hometown Days were very well received and produced approximately \$7,000 to \$8,000. President Jon became happier.

Interestingly, smoking was banned at meetings due to a new City ordinance. A majority of the Club's membership, predictably non-smokers, embraced the change.

President Jon's debunking was at the Westin Hotel in Millbrae. He was ridiculed, abused, and generally made to feel small in perfect Rotary roasting tradition. Kevin Holden was installed as the Club's new President before he could run out of the building.

At the time I didn't fully realize the magnitude of it, but obtaining our Club's unanimous approval to stand behind the construction of the San Carlos Youth Center; and our November kick off luncheon was most memorable. It was fellowship at its finest as once every two months on a Saturday morning one of three 20-person teams would don the orange jerseys and rid the freeway of debris.

Our Club also was involved with Adopt-A-School, San Carlos Service Club for Seniors Caring Cupboard, San Mateo County Abused Children, Harvest of the Mind, Brittan Acres Adopt-A-School, ROPES, and the San Carlos School District. As a result of our efforts we were voted the #1 Community Service Club in the District.

On the social side we enjoyed a very successful summer BBQ, a children's Christmas party, Mystery Night, and, of course, the much anticipated Installation/Debunking. We also fielded a mediocre softball team, but our athletic membership managed to stomp the Belmont Club in a golf challenge.

And if our Club has a reputation for playing hard, we work hard also. Successful fundraisers included the Dixieland Jazz Festival, an auction, and the Pancake Breakfast and Fun Run. We continued to handsomely support the RI Foundation, and we kept the wheels rolling in our worldwide quest to stamp out polio by inaugurating Polio Plus USA.

In all, I feel very proud of my year serving our San Carlos Rotary Club as President. Rotary International's goal of continuity and change was something we actively practiced; and I feel that I left the Presidency with the Club in better shape than I found it.

My year began with the Rotary International Convention in Taipei, Taiwan. After the Installation Dinner Dance and Roast, the next activity was a Club potluck picnic at Huddart Park on Sunday, September 18th. In November we had a Casino Night at the Hotel Sofitel. Though we grossed over \$11,000, our net was less than \$3,000. Most of the money went to the hotel for food and rent. Therefore, the directive went out to keep the costs down for the Auction in February. This was held at the Casa de Flores which was rented at a very nominal sum. The members of the Club brought potluck items supplemented by catered pasta and vegetable dishes. We netted over \$14,000.

The Pancake Breakfast and Fun Run also provided around \$3,000 and \$8,000 respectively. We had neither a Christmas party for the welfare children nor a dinner/dance for the Club.

The Youth Center project was well along, with weekly meetings of the various committees. Rotarians pledged the first \$100,000 for seed money. Attempts to tie down the location and get a design were successful so we could go to the community for funding. This was done outside of Rotary, but most of the key players, especially Vera Lindeburg, were Rotarians.

We fielded a softball team in the city league. Each week we got the results of the play in the KEYWAY. Our team was quite successful, winning more than their share of the contests. The following summer this same team competed and won the city tournament sponsored by councilman Buckmaster. That meant that the following year we had to return to defend our title!

We had a baby! Sue Tenerowicz was pregnant and had her baby in May. This was the second baby we had in the Club with the mother being a member.

In May, the Board received a petition for the resurrection of the Jazz Festival. This project had expanded beyond the Club to a district project, but with declining attendance, the Club took it back and killed it for a year. After much discussion and pledges from several members to make up any shortfall, the project was approved for the following September. This was a very large project, with a need for several hundred volunteers, a great unifying effort for Rotary. With venues all over the city, it netted over \$60,000 but cost over \$70,000.

The District Conference was held at Lake Tahoe's Sheraton Tahoe. The entertainment included a slot-machine poker tournament. We also had dinner at the Ponderosa Ranch, the resort area where the TV show "Ponderosa" did the outdoor filming and also some of the farmhouse shots. San Carlos won awards at the Conference for best Club bulletin for big clubs (over 90 members).

The year ended with the Rotary International Convention in Nice, France. The Club voted to pay for Jorgen Nielsen's attendance there, an honor bestowed upon our Secretary.

Under Vocational Service we did an employee of the month and a career shadowing.

Our Club started the official photographer for San Carlos Rotary project with Phyllis Du Bois and Hans Slade the lead photographers. A huge focus was made on membership, and we were able to increase it to 87 members by the end of the year.

Phyllis Du Bois did a knock out job on public relations. We had articles in the local newspaper concerning our Club almost every month.

Among our social events during the year, we had a well-attended Christmas Party which was held at the Palo Alto University Club.

The Club won awards at the annual District Conference for the best Club in community service, best bulletin, and best Club for membership increase.

Bruce Paris came through the ranks of San Carlos Rotary in his path to the presidency having served as Treasurer from 1989 to 1990 and Director from 1990 to 1996. During this period of his Rotary development he was chairman of the Rotary Fun Run and director in charge of International Service, Membership & Administration. As a new President of the Rotary Club of San Carlos, Bruce's goals for the year included: completion of the San Carlos Rotary Youth Center, greater participation and higher profile for the Fun Run, the creation of a Rotary Garage Sale event, continuation of the Children's Christmas Party, further success of the Adopt-A-School Program, development of Rotaract activities, increased scholarship funding, continued support of SCSCS, continuation of the Highway Cleanup Program, financial support of the new Health Screening Program, and a strong Social Events Program.

One of President Bruce's first personal projects was to establish a regular column in the KEYWAY to better communicate the vision of his forthcoming year to club members. The column was named "Message From the Helm" as President Bruce is an avid sailor and often used sailing as a metaphor in his stories and proposals as director. The many "From the Helm" articles discussed current progress on projects, mentorship, financial strength of the Club, and acknowledged the many good deeds of Club members. Topics also included current events, international concerns, domestic news and local issues as the KEYWAY has always been the club's weekly forum, and Bruce wanted to keep important issues on the active minds of Rotarians.

After establishing goals for his forthcoming year, he and his Board set about achieving all they could. As a result of the great efforts of the many fundraising committees, the following fundraisers' successes were achieved: the Garage Sale Committee made the club some \$3,000 in its first year of existence. The San Carlos Rotary Auction Committee generated \$28,000 gross with a net of some \$18,000 while involving the efforts of nearly every member of the Club. The Fun Run Committee provided yet another boost to the budget with a healthy \$10,000 profit along with significant community exposure. In a surprise opportunity, the Club was offered a donation of a houseboat and the Board, after thoughtful consideration and counsel, accepted the vessel for purposes of resale. After some repairs were made, the boat was sold to a club member at a profit of \$12,000. One condition of the sale was that the vessel be delivered to Redwood City Marina from the Delta. As transport was to expensive, the Board appointed President Bruce and Director Bob Gutgsell to sail the calm-water houseboat to the destination from Rio Vista. The all day passage led the mighty crew through one engine failure and near rescue, a sailboat race near Treasure Island and finally waves that lapped up the sliding doors a good three feet. All was well, however, when the boat tied up in Redwood City some 12 hours later, and the Club was some \$12,000 richer. Overall, the year closed on a financially positive note.

On the expense side, President Bruce oversaw the allocation of some \$10,000 toward San Carlos Rotary Scholarships, a near doubling of past years funding. San Carlos Rotary's greatest vision came to fruition in this year as the San Carlos Rotary Youth Center began construction and was scheduled for completion in September of 1997. The completion of the Youth Center represented the culmination of some five years of effort and vision by the Club and the donation of over \$2,000,000, \$300,000 of which came directly from San Carlos Rotarians. General community service donations were near \$12,000 and long range planning received a healthy \$6,000 in its kitty. "We came, we earned, we spent". It was a good year financially for the Club.

On the social side, an opportunity was conceived between the presidents of the newly formed Woodside Rotary Club, the Belmont Rotary Club, and our own San Carlos Rotary Club to join forces on our annual Christmas parties, the main premise being to help the Woodside Club feel welcome in the neighborhood. The event went off at Sharon Heights Country Club and was a resounding success and all made new friends got merry for the night and home safe in the end. Rotary softball was very popular with the Club and we finished the season with more wins than losses. Mystery Night was a hit when we visited a local play via bus. The summer picnic was well attended, and, in general, much fellowship was shared throughout the year

Overall, Bruce's presidency achieved its goal of funding all of its programs, creating great fellowship in the process, and living up to the most important rule of Rotary – "Service Above Self".

Having been officially launched as Rotary Prez in July, it only took two short months for the deserved recognition by the President of the United States – Bill Clinton – to arrive in town. Bill and Hillary were honored guests and speakers at the San Carlos Charter Learning Center...a Don Shalvey production, during which yours truly wore a "press pass" in my chapeau, instead of my usual crown.

Mid-September, one of our own politicians, David Buckmaster, arranged a softball tourney between our Club, Loyola-Marymount alums and some real ringers to raise money for the Youth Center campaign. (Nobody ever, with the exception of Bob Watkins, would remember the score by Monday.)

By the way, the Youth Center was a little 2.5 million-dollar project that Vera Lindeburg, our Club, and local "movers and shakers" took on so that latchkey pre-drivers would have a safe and productive place to hang out after school. And in this connection, there were community kickoff picnics at Burton Park (2), a gathering at the opening of Houlihan's Restaurant, and numerous neighborhood wine 'n' cheese parties to garner monetary pledges to begin construction. Our Club raised \$150,000 toward this effort.

Meanwhile, the weekly Friday lunchers requesting special entrées from the kitchen (instead of the one being served) were driving the cook and staff nuts. To stem the inevitable revolt, Sue Tenerowicz and I met with Salvatore and agreed that each week four different and distinctly healthy entrées would be available for our members.

At the end of October, one of two Oktoberfests was held at the Greek Church's gym, complete with a four-piece oompah-pah band, Bavarian-clad folk dancers, Spatan beer and an authentic German buffet. The event raised a little over \$8,000 with 430 tickets sold, and all in all, a lively, spirited party!

With the advent of multiple community auctions, it became prudent to create a new spring fund-raiser and put our "somewhat tired" silent and live auction on the shelf temporarily. The idea of a Western theme/line-dance shindig with a Ford Mustang car raffle was previewed. The proposal was met with little enthusiasm by the Club, so this did not materialize. What did, however, was a full membership assessment of \$100 each to meet our scholarship goals. Remarkably, a positive result did ensue with the creation of a fund-raising task force comprised of a few Past Presidents, a select group from the Board and Club, with the gavel resting in my hands. A NIGHT TO REMEMBER was born and executed one day before Valentine's Day 1999. One year later the theme was changed to A NIGHT AT THE OSCARS.

With the 8th annual Fun Run in view, the committee began an extensive search for sponsorship. This was the first time Rountree Plumbing came on board with some significant dollars. The Fun Run and Pancake Breakfast continue to be one of Rotary's most visible and viable community events.

Internationally speaking, we were proud to be sending soccer uniforms and equipment to the children in war-torn Bosnia on a frequent basis with the help of intermediary Warren Dale. In addition, we supported the annual AMOR pilgrimage to Mexico where organized construction of dwellings was done by teams of teenagers and adults during one week in June.

The imposing body that comprised my Board passed many interesting proposals during the term-two of them are worthy of note. The first, met with considerable disdain by the members, was the \$5 "duck-out" fine. The second, which received a "thumbs up" was the \$3,000 contribution of an electronic scoreboard for Rotary's field at Highlands Park North -- a gift to the youth of our community -- to replace the old one, which was in a state of complete disrepair.

And, finally, with Gail Boyle as Social Chair, we had ourselves some grand parties: a Holiday gala at the Sharon Heights Golf & Country Club along with Belmont and Woodside-Portola Valley Rotarians, a Mystery Night that took us to Mac's Los Altos Restaurant for the dinner/theater performance upstairs, and a debunking I shall never forget at the Peninsula Golf & Country Club. Those cute UCLA cheerleaders I did not recognize were later identified as John Watkins, Ray Snider, Jim Maffei, and Fred Marcussen...oh, what legs!

At PETS (President Elect Training Seminar) I got to talk with incoming RI President Carlos Ravizza, and I got the same 45 seconds in Singapore. Talking to Carlos in person for no more then 90 seconds was enough to hook me into the big picture. His theme was "Act With Consistency, Credibility and Continuity". He also believed that Rotary needs a "quantity of

quality" in its membership and that's how I took on my role as President. I hit the podium running with a thank you to all the Past Presidents in a short one-man skit. It was funny, but an actor I am not.

NATO (Night at the Oscars) was in its second year and was changing quite a bit. It changed from a Valentine's Day party to an Oscar party, and Gail Boyle had an "in" at the Sheraton in Palo Alto. So onward we went with Terry Wilson as Chair. The contract was signed the first week I was in office and the event was to be in February. Allan Frumkin was kind enough to come to our Club and put on his show which reminded us what it is to be a good Rotarian.

The next week was our Club Forum and I put a letter in the Keyway (with the help of Terry Wilson) that read, "In order for our Club to maintain its status as the best Rotary Club in the world, we rely heavily on our membership and their hard work in the area of Community Service." It reminded our Club of our community service projects. "Areas of service include environment and drugs, handicapped/safety, senior citizens, youth scouts, donations, club scholarships, adopt-a-school, Top Gear(RYLA), Youth Center, long range planning, literacy program, adopt-a-family, Healthy City Program/Anti Graffiti, immunization program, mentor program, and tutoring, and that is only Community Service. One of the worst assumptions a new or a long-term member could make, would be to assume that these committees have all the help they need to achieve their success. Rotary worldwide is seeking members whose motto is to say YES to most all Rotary requests. That's why San Carlos Rotary is the best, and always will be the best Club in the world because we all realize how important our efforts are in benefiting those in our community. The most sterling example is the soon-to-open San Carlos Youth Center. Several years ago the Center was only a Rotary vision. Over \$2.2 million later, with member contributions among others, the Youth Center will become the centerpiece of Burton Park. See how you can get involved". That Friday (fourth week as President), I thought that if anyone attended the following week's meeting I would be O.K. for the year.

Next week did come and so did the Fine Bucks. Mark Burket had taken my picture and made a coupon book selling ten \$5 coupons for \$45 and sold well over \$1,000 on the first day. Fine Bucks were a hit as people did not have to have cash to pay a fine.

In August the Youth Center opened it's doors to ALL. What a party!!! With that project done we had nothing to do but work on NATO and play Fantasy Football. On August 31st we lost George "Papa" Watts, a member of our Club since 1954. "Papa" had done it all. Representing our Club, I went to about nine more funerals that year and must say I did not enjoy that part of the job.

September was our Club's 50th anniversary party and Rick King was the speaker that night. The party was to be in Cameron Miller's year but we had to move the date due to cost and we had to move Rick King's date. Man, you would have thought the world was going to end. Cameron and I had to sit next to him and listen to him complain all night long. Who knew he would be RI's President a few years later! The best part of that night was Travis Jackson's slide show of our Club over the past 50 years and, of course, the pictures of Hanna his grand-daughter.

October saw the loss of the wives of Ray Cook and Chuck Baker. But the good news was Jorgen Nielsen got honored for Distinguished Service, the highest honor bestowed upon a Rotarian.

October also was the very last time any changes could be made to the NEW Black Book as it was to be going to press. The San Carlos Rotary Endowment was formed, the first Board being Cameron Miller, Mark Schiavenza, Bob Barone, Jim Fahnestock, Phyllis Du Bois, Brenda Goldberg, and Katy Lindbloom.

November was marked with the funding from our Club to close White Oaks Way and to put in a large pathway from one side of the campus to the other at White Oaks School. For years, children had to cross a street to go to other classrooms in the same school. This would make the campus much safer.

December saw more funerals, and NATO tickets were distributed but no one sold any. We also had decided not to have a Christmas party due to the 50th anniversary party in September and NATO in February. So, for the last meeting of the 20th century, I put my credit card on the bar and told everyone to have a good time (not the smartest thing I could have done or maybe it was). Salvatore's was packed that day, and we had a Christmas party with music played by our own Jim Stevens. I toasted everyone with these words, "So far, my Presidency is all that I thought, and more. I realize how vital it is for all of us to work together on our goals, and we are doing just that. But today is just for fun. Here's wishing each and every one of you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. We are heading into a new millennium, and we are set to handle the challenges ahead. Thank YOU again for all your great support." Man, was our Club rolling full speed ahead into 2000. I am still making payments on that credit card, but the Club had a great time and people were ready and willing to work for Rotary.

January saw SLOW ticket sales to NATO and the committee was beginning to get nervous. By the end of the month, people were starting to perk up to the event. Gail Boyle advised the Club (as only Gail could do) how she was selling tickets, and she was selling tickets! Art Pollock and Don Shalvey announced that The Joe Sharino Band would be performing at NATO, Art would be bringing Ed Rodgers (his friend who won a real Oscar) to the party, and Mark Burket again would be taking portraits of all guest holding the real Oscar. Gail Boyle and Phyllis Dubois were working very hard on the silent auction and balloon raffle, and Don Whitley started counting ticket sales.

February brought NATO closer -- some of us sold tickets and some did not (what else is new). Jim Fahnestock and others sold tickets on Laurel Street on Saturdays and Sundays and showed the car that was to be given away the night of the event. By the middle of the month, we had a hard count of 374, a lot better then the 230 reported the week before. The night of the event was Grand. Everyone had worked so hard, the place had magic in the air, all were ready to party and party we did! If we had sold all 600 tickets, we would have had big problems. We had both floors of the Sheraton and it was standing room only. Joe Sharino rocked the night away and I had never seen so many people dancing. Downstairs was filled with auction items, and people bought. This night was and may still be the biggest one-day fund raising event that the San Carlos Rotary Club has ever had. February did end on a sad note; we saw the passing of Armand Johnson. Armand was a charter member of our Club and was president in 1954/1955. However, Chuck Baker a Charter member was setting up a ski trip for our members and is still doing that today.

March started off slow as everyone was burned out from the big event, but towards the end of the month we started pushing the Fun Run and Pancake Breakfast. March ended with no funerals, thank God! I was getting tired of putting on the black suit.

April was slow on the front lines, but in the back office the numbers were still being crunched, and when all was said and done, NATO brought in over \$65,000 making it the single best day San Carlos Rotary ever had. Many people made this happen, but I could not have picked a better chairperson. Terry Wilson knows how to get it done. Terry enlisted some very special people like Gail Boyle, Jeri Fujimoto, Art Pollock, Phyllis Du Bois, Mark Schiavenza, Mark Burket, Ted Reynolds, Don Shalvey, Don Whitley, and many more. Everyone ended up helping in some way. It was great, San Carlos was strong and getting stronger. Having received the members' completed surveys, it was agreed that the Sheraton was too small and we needed a new place.

May brought on spring and Hometown Days. The Fun Run and the Pancake Breakfast at Hometown Days is the single most visible day that Rotary could ever ask for. We own Sunday at Hometown Days. The Fun Run had about 300 runners, and the Pancake Breakfast served about 600 to 800. Phyllis Du Bois and Bruce Paris did a bang-up job on the Fun Run, and Art Pollock did the same on the Pancake Breakfast. We had 98% member participation that day. San Carlos Rotary (I mean its members) got the job done one more time. It must be also noted that San Carlos did win the 8th Annual Pete Lynch Memorial Golf Tournament even with Jim McGovern cheating as he does so well.

June brought in the youngest member to join our Club. Carrick Sears was twenty-three years old and would not leave me alone. After meeting with him in person and many phone calls, I was impressed so much that I asked Jeri Fujimoto to sponsor him into our club. June also marked the end of Dr. Don "Do Wop" Shalvey as the head of San Carlos schools. Don was working on a new concept of school and he got the front page of the Wall Street Journal and never looked back. A community party (roast) was held and Rotary cooked Don well. Later in June, Forbes King was awarded Citizen of the Year by the Chamber of Commerce, and one more party took place. At the end of June my debunking took place -- yes, one more party! I was very nervous about the debunking, but they went easy on me thanks to my wonderful wife Nancy. They developed a skit that advertised the fact that I did nothing in my term. That was exactly my thought, I did nothing, and the membership did tremendous things. In my final words as President I thanked EVERYONE that worked on something during the year to make this world a better place. Act with Consistency, Credibility and Continuity and you don't have to do anything more. One person can't do what many can.

To this day and for the rest of my life, I am thankful for all the help people gave me that year. I really had the best year of my life and I am so very happy that I got to serve as President of the Best Rotary Club in the world. Thanks again to everyone that made this year so special to Rotary and to me. The club (YOU) did all of the above...what a year to be President. Thanks so much!!!

Accepting the San Carlos Rotary Club's nomination to serve as President for 2000-2001 was my willingness to take on a huge responsibility. I was delegated to a position where our membership awaited my actions, my thoughts and my decisions.

Couple that success with the other net income from the Club's perennial winners: the Pancake Breakfast and the Fun Run, our Club was in a strong financial position. Special recognition should be given to Phyllis DuBois, Forbes King, Bob Gutgsell and Arthur Pollock for their outstanding hard work and dedication. Obtaining corporate sponsors to help subsidize expenses and profitability became a bigger focal point in our Club's efforts to raise money. We even netted over \$4,000 for the "Chair." As a joke at my first meeting, Stuart Johnson had blown up a photo someone had taken of me and placed it in my previous seat at Table 6. Not wishing to stare at myself from the podium for even one minute, I begged someone to buy the seat that day for \$100. The idea really caught on and our membership must have agreed because I sold that seat nearly every week during my Presidency. I thank them for that.

Since I joined the Club in 1988, our membership has always maintained a tremendous collective sense of humor. We apparently really enjoy each other's company. I have said forever that "we were a Club that worked hard and played hard." We proved that at each of our social events. There is no more enjoyable evening than the Mystery Night; and the Installation/Debunking lets out a year's worth of whatever regarding the previous regime. I loved every minute of it.

With our coffers filled, we were eager to disburse! Student scholars were the main recipients as \$17,000 was earmarked for them. Local organizations received nearly \$10,000. The San Carlos Rotary Endowment Fund, which had been recently developed and administered by Roberto Barone and Mark Schiavenza, got a healthy contribution of \$20,000. We even had some money left over for my successor, Jeri Fujimoto, who proved she could spend with the best of them. Internationally, we continued to support the Balls for Bosnia project, engaged in a new wheelchair program, and forged on with the campaign to eradicate polio from around the globe. I am still overwhelmed by the Polio-Plus campaign. More than two billion children around the world have received the vaccine. How could that be accomplished is truly a miracle, and the ultimate in determination!

My only regret was that I was unable to attend the International Conference in Buenos Aires—a must for every Rotarian I am told—but I did feel the spirit and conscience of Rotary every day I served as President. Much of that impetus should be attributed to our beloved and late Jorgen Nielsen who was a secretary non pariel. With Jorgen I was always above the curve in the doings of Rotary, both within the District and throughout the world. I can't imagine how I would have fared without his guidance, and constant prodding? Through his incredible stamina and

determination our Club earned 1st place in the District Awards for Youth Service and Paul Harris; 2nd for the Wally Meyers Award and the weekly newsletter, the KEYWAY; and 3rd in Community Service and attendance.

One memorable experience in my esteemed position as President was attending a make-up meeting down in Montego Bay, Jamaica. I announced to their group at their dinner that I was currently serving as San Carlos Rotary President. Attending the meeting with me were three Past Presidents: Gary Goss, Arthur Pollock and Cameron Miller. Now that's something! I know the aforementioned trio has many, many more world-wide make ups than myself, and I admire them for that. I'm sure there is still time in my Rotary future.

Rotary has taught me one incredible thing. It is the spirit, dedication and devotion of each member to serve mankind. This camaraderie, which is shared by every Rotarian around the world, is truly remarkable. It is what makes this organization thrive, and grow, and succeed where other organizations have tried and failed. The common bond is undeniable and cannot be broken. As the world becomes smaller by virtue of our greater recognition, we are keenly aware as Rotarians of the horrendous hardships which most of the population endures. Even in an affluent city like San Carlos, our Club fills a need that would otherwise be neglected. The need for Rotary, and dedicated Rotarians, becomes more vital every day. Every club president is brought closer to the pulse of Rotary during their year and passes that leadership mantle on to their successor. To have been given that opportunity, and experience, I am forever grateful.

The Club received four awards at the District Conference in May 2003 for membership growth and fund raising.

Meetings

We moved into our new home at Piacere Ristorante in July 2002 after meeting in Belmont for much of the previous year. Coming home to San Carlos sparked a new level of interest in member recruiting as shown by the 19 new members added during the year. Arthur Pollock and Vera Lindeburg led the way in member recruiting. To increase social opportunities for Club members, we established a new program of mixers. By year-end after-work mixers were being held twice monthly at Piacere.

Fund Raising

Director Chris Edwards did a superb job in leading our fund raising efforts. The three principal fund raising activities of the Club – the Night At The Oscars party at Hotel Sofitel, and the Hometown Days Fun Run and Pancake Breakfast – produced net funds of \$55,000.

Rotary International Foundation and Polio Plus

Our Foundation/Polio Plus committee headed by John Watkins exceeded our goals by nearly 50% by personally contacting every member of the Club to request donations. Thanks to Chester Fisher, our Club led the way in organizing a special fundraiser for Polio Plus – a benefit performance of A Christmas Carol at Notre Dame de Namur University for Peninsula Rotary Clubs. This special event netted \$10,260 for Polio Plus.

Endowment

As a result of our fund raising success the Board was able to transfer a total of \$32,000 at year-end 2003 to the Club's Endowment. Club members decided during the year to make our Endowment the Club's Centennial Project for 2005.

Community Service

We increased our Scholarship and Donations Committee funding to a total of \$27,000. Cameron Miller headed our Scholarship Committee and presented checks for \$17,000 to deserving college-bound students. Arlan Young headed our Donations Committee and distributed \$10,000 to local non-profit and community organizations in and around San Carlos.

International Service

Director Judy Brown revitalized our efforts in International Service by establishing collaborative projects with other clubs to dig 10 vital wells for drinking water in Southern India and to build a cattle and goat farm on the Indonesian island of Sumba.

Vocational Service

Director Steve Buxton launched our first job-shadowing program for middle school students. A total of 25 students participated and gained valuable exposure to a variety of career opportunities by spending the morning at the workplace of Club members and enjoying career conversations at one-on-one lunches.

Summary

The Club finished the year with a renewed sense of energy for projects in the four areas of service, as well as momentum in membership growth. Challenges that lie ahead include integrating 19 new members into the Club's service project committees and concerns about the size of the meeting room at Piacere and its ability to handle the needs of a growing club.

WOW! What a Centennial Year!

As I look back on the past 12 months, I can only think of all the hard work, energy, and enthusiasm -- what our members, their families, and friends, have done for this great club of San Carlos!

There have been many accomplishments this year—both for our club, and by our club for Rotary:

- 1. Inducted three new members -Janet Rabin, Val Vandervort, and Jack Sremack
- 2. Brought back some of our club's traditions, i.e. Club BBQ at Jim McGovern's, Christmas Dinner Dance at University Club in Palo Alto, going to a ballgame at PacBell Park to see SF Giants and Washington Nationals
- 3. Increased the number of social events
- 4. Raised almost \$50,000 for charity and scholarships
- 5. Obtained a Rotary International Grant—we received a \$1000 District Grant for our Literacy Project
- 6. Gave \$8,000 (\$1,000 to each local San Carlos School Principal in person) for our Literacy Project—a need as 25% of all students are illiterate
- 7. Became a 100% Paul Harris Fellowship Club
- 8. Our Centennial Project: Increased our club's Endowment by a little over \$34,000 for a termending total of \$164,287
- 9. Did some International Projects: we donated \$4,350 for the following--a Hearing Aid project w/RC Peninsula club (which became a \$20,000 matching grant project), Tsunami Relief (over \$1,700 from our club and its members, and over \$5million given by US Rotarians), and \$1,500 for a Guadalajara project
- 10. Adopt A Family we gave food, toys, and clothing to six under privileged families
- 11. Our club's members cleaned up part of San Carlos (on The Alameda De Las Pulgas Ave. between Melendy and San Carlos Ave.
- 12. Through the local media we obtained more exposure by informing the public about what our club and Rotary does. This was done by placing ads in the local paper every other month.
- 13. 52 members and families attended the District Foundation dinner
- 14. Four members attended the Rotary International Convention
- 15. Had the most Shadow Day participants ever. This project involved having students at a member's job site for the day.
- 16. Put a President's column each week in the KeyWay (gave updates and key info to our members)
- 17. Received the City of San Carlos Proclamation from Mayor Inge Tiegel Doherty which proclaimed February 23, 2005 as Rotary Day

The above are only a few of our club's accomplishments. We also set several club records as well:

- 1. 407 people were served at our Pancake Breakfast, and almost \$17,000 was netted between it and the Fun Run
- 2. Scholarships we gave just shy of \$19,000, with \$2,000 of that amount coming from our Centennial Project (our Endowment Fund). These were the first two scholarships from this fund
- 3. 52 members and guests attended the District Foundation dinner

- 4. Being the first club to win the Districts' 1st Annual Texas Holdem' Tournament; yes, your President won the tournament
- 5. Our club to date has given over \$350,000 to the RI Foundation

An area that had caused some twists and turns was our club having some fun juggling between meeting locations, from Piacere's on Laurel Street to The Van's in Belmont where we continue to meet until further notice.

Additional social events that took place: Brew your own Beer day at Devils Canyon Brewery in Belmont, Mystery Night at the Biscuits and Blues restaurant in San Francisco, and our Social Nights on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays primarily held at Piacere's. We had a joint Centennial evening meeting with Belmont on February 23rd held at The Van's.

Many thank you's go out to the following people: all the Board Members; Treasurer: Steve San Filippo; Secretary: Stuart Johnson; Social Events: Carrick Sears, Jeri Fujimoto, and Chester Fisher; Foundation: Fred Marcussen and John Watkins; Rotary History books: Ray Snider and John Watkins; Photographers/Club Advertising: Phyllis DuBois and Hans Slade; Speakers: Chris Davis; Fundraising: Chris Edwards, Steve Eldridge, and Phyllis DuBois; Pancake and Fun Run: Bruce Paris and Bob Gutsgell; Sgt.-At-Arms: Vern Heller for setting up meetings; all other committee members not previously mentioned.

All of you have made a beneficial difference to other non-Rotarians' lives during this past year—whether it was by a hands on project or a monetary gift.

Being President of the Rotary Club of San Carlos during the 2005-2006 year was an experience I will cherish for the rest of my life. My mission began early at the powerful and enriching PETS conference; and that was followed up by my attendance at the Centennial Rotary International Convention held in Chicago.

I was extremely grateful for the opportunity to serve as the Club's representative to the greatest service club in the world. I am also thankful and appreciative to each and every member of my Board of Directors who supported my presidency during the year; and to the membership of our Club who also provided their encouragement and hard work.

The Rotary Club of San Carlos is proudly a 100% Paul Harris Fellow Club.

On the financial side, we were able to make a \$13,000 contribution to the Foundation--\$10,000 coming from the auction of my Maui condo. An additional \$12,000 was contributed to community events, while the always-in-demand youth scholarships received \$18,000. The Rotary Club of San Carlos joined Rotary International with \$4500 in matching grants. The San Carlos Rotary Endowment, founded in the 1999-2000 year was given an additional \$10,000,

bringing its accumulated total to nearly \$200,000. The Club's huge contribution appetite was satiated partially by \$20,000 in sponsorship contributions.

During the year we held a wine tasting event to raise funds for the Endowment. The event featured a Zydeco band which was a big hit with the attendees. Additionally, we held a Sock Hop in the spring to raise funds for scholarships. Our perennial long-term fundraisers: the pancake breakfast and the 5K/10K run walk—with more than 450 runners/walkers—held in conjunction with San Carlos Hometown Days continues to bring Rotary recognition within the community. We also took on the community project of repainting lampposts along the City's main street.

Since previous administrations had pushed so hard with fundraising, we took a more relaxed approach during my administration and imposed an assessment of \$300 per member in cash or in-kind donations. Eighty-four percent of the membership actually made the commitment.

The tragedy of Hurricane Katrina did not escape the reaches of San Carlos Rotary as we formed a sister-club relationship with the Pass Christian Club in Mississippi, providing cash, books and other essentials to get those poor, unfortunate souls back on track towards a new normal life. We are continuing our efforts with them.

On the technical side, we have developed a web site which contains more information than one could possibly imagine, and it is becoming more voluminous and informative each day. And to ensure that our audio-visual and technical capabilities are running smoothly, I have decided to eliminate myself from participation.

To ensure greater accountability, we formed a committee to develop the handling of our numerous accounts; and to be able to provide accurate accounting to our membership. All meetings and events were conducted with positive financial results.

The year was not without incident as throughout my entire administration we were displaced to the Van's Restaurant. Although they have treated us like royalty, they are not in San Carlos and traveling to Belmont weekly has hindered membership and the recruitment of new members. The last several years in Belmont is the longest period of time that our Club has not met on a regular basis in San Carlos since 1967 when we left the Villa Chartier in San Mateo after eleven (11) years. For the year we had a net gain of two members, which in spite of the aforementioned hindrance was rather impressive. Our new members are very solid community members; however, the loss of our Donation Chairman, our Club Treasurer, and former Club Secretary had a huge impact.

On balance, I would conclude by saying that despite enduring the rainiest year in Bay Area history our Club kept a sunny disposition about who we are, and what we do as Rotarians. We are so proud that the 20+ year campaign to wipe the dreaded polio from the face of the earth is nearly complete. That mammoth project alone makes each and every Rotarian so very proud to be a member of the world's most productive service organization. It gives me great pride to have been chosen to lead this powerful group over the past year as we continue on our life-long mission as Rotarians to confront the three H's: health, hunger and humanity on an international scale.

The "Student of the Month" program was introduced where the Club hosted two remarkable students each month, as selected by Rotarian Superintendent of the Elementary Schools, Steve Mitrovich.

The fundraiser for the year was a showstopper at Sparky's Hot Rod Garage, where Rotarians and many guests eyed pristine hot rods, wined, dined and witnessed President-Elect Jonathan Nicolas singing Karaoke. The event was emceed by our own Jim Fahnestock who announced wonderful raffle prizes and talked a lot. We also held a high-quality silent auction, which raised over \$4,000 in and of itself. We netted slightly more than \$30,000 which may have been the equivalent to the booze consumed at the event.

December was a fun month. Club Members Janette Rabin, Mark (and Lisa) Schiavenza, and Bob (and Barbara) Lanzone volunteered their afternoon at the KQED fundraising drive with world-traveler Rick Steves! Not only did they raise a lot of funds for KQED, they were on television all afternoon. We held our annual Holiday party at Union Bank again, hosted by Rotarian Fariba Thomas. The "pot-luck" idea was another success, with Rotarian Dave Blewett's potato skins being the ever-delicious success. Finally, Rotarian Bernie Mellot spearheaded the food and gift drive for five needy San Carlos families. Club members made individual contributions totaling over \$1,200 for the families.

We continued to donate heavily to many worthy local causes, totaling \$14,000, and also funded the scholarships to worthy high school seniors totaling \$17,000.

With so much going on, it was time to get a little recognition. Christine Boland applied for several awards, and alas, we got several. We received a district award for the Medium Sized Club for our work with Youth in the Community B.U.G.S. Program (Better Understanding of Garden Science at Brittan Acres Elementary,) Dictionary project, hosting the Children's' International Summer Village the previous summer, scholarship program, etc.) and for Community Awareness of Rotary (Took 1st place at Hometown Days Parade, hosted a booth at Farmers Market to sell pancake tickets and gave away spatulas, poured beer at Art & Wine Faire, and held the annual Pancake Breakfast and Fun Run at Hometown Days.) The club also received a presidential citation from the District Governor and received a District simplified grant to beautify the neglected plants in the parking island in the back of Bianchini's Market.

We purchased "Vodo", another adorable K-9 puppy for the City of San Carlos Police Department, who subsequently received his "badge" and "vest" from PD. Through our donations our Club was able to replace the baseball score board at Highlands Park and contributed to the restoration of the children's area at Burton Park.

Our international project consisted of combining \$7,000 of our funds with the Foster City Rotary Club in their support of building schools in Cambodia. This distribution of our funds will be given over a two-year period of time.

The year ended on a terrific note with the Debunking held during the Club meeting. The "President" followed a familiar Green Brick Road in the hopes of finding all of the tools necessary to get to the "Land of Cause" in time. Along the way, he met some interesting characters – much like the interesting characters in the Club – including the Cowardly Fundraiser, the Endowment Monkeys, Vodo the Police Dog, Two Men Waiting (for what we don't know), and finally the Wiz, in the Land of Cause.

Thanks to everyone involved in Club participation, fundraising, camaraderie, and good old-fashioned fun. It was quite a year in Rotary history.

My tenure as President was unique in the history of the Rotary Club of San Carlos. I served as both President and Treasurer and maintained the web site. I established two new fundraisers: a golf tournament at Moffett Field, and a dedicated Fundraiser named Reubens for Rotary at Steve Carlson's home. In addition, we had a spring gala and, of course, the Fun Run and the Pancake Breakfast at Home Town Days.

The golf tournament, the first week of November, was to raise funds for Community Services, Inc. to spend on scholarships, the Donations Committee grant recipients, and the Caring Cupboard. The golf course did a lot of the work as far as organizing the event, printing score cards, and providing a taco buffet afterwards. The Club stuffed the donated goody bags, solicited sponsors, and got restaurant gift cards to use as prizes. Pete Nannarone was the event chairman and coordinated with the course. Jonathan Nicolas hosted the committee meetings and coordinated with Hole-in-One USA who wrote the hole-in-one insurance policy and printed the hole sponsor signs. Jonathan also handled selling all 52 chances on the raffle and served as MC for the award ceremonies. Roberto Barone brought in the restaurant gift cards. Multiple people brought in hole sponsors, and our usual annual sponsors kicked in with the incentive of being included in this event because they brought in money earlier than usual. We raised \$8,555.

In December, Dave and Gwen Blewett hosted the Christmas Party. It was fabulous! There was plenty of food and drink and it was well attended. There were 15 decorated Christmas trees spread throughout their home.

The next fundraiser was in February at Green Hills Country Club. Bill and Betsy Koefoed did a great job negotiating with the Country Club so we could maximize the net. With the larger net, we were able to spend

more on our programs. The spouses really pitched in on this one, handling registration, reception, the silent auction, and stuff I don't really understand. Pamela Alexander did a great job with the centerpieces and decorations. The theme was love and Valentines Day. Bob Gutgsell with help from Mary Marie Bates staged a photo shoot of all the attendees next to the fireplace. Both the food and wine was good. The speeches were minimized, and the auction was efficient and successful. We raised \$10,037.

The next fundraiser was the annual Home Town Days duo of the Fun Run and the Pancake Breakfast. Both events went like clockwork. We raised \$9,309 from the Fun Run and \$5,683 from the Pancake Breakfast. We did lose one grill to old age, but At found a replacement at a Trinity Presbyterian Church garage sale.

The last fundraiser of the year was a new one for the Club called Reubens for Rotary. It was a dedicated fundraiser to raise money for the Atlas Mountains Project to improve the water supply and quality for a village in the High Atlas Mountains of Morocco. We fed 142 people and raised \$15,616. Most all of the food was handmade.

In total, we raised \$49,911 for the year, a very successful year.

Rotary year 2018-2019 was a year of new initiatives and big projects for the Rotary Club of San Carlos. Here's a few of the highlights.

Morocco High Atlas Aqueduct Global Grant. We made final preparations for submitting our global grant application to fund the construction of an aqueduct in Morocco's High Atlas Mountains, in the Berber villages where President Steve Carlson previously served in the Peace Corps. In April 2019, President Carlson traveled to Morocco with his son, Jimmy, to do a final inspection of the proposed project, and worked through some details of the project. Fundraising continued, with at least the following clubs pledging District Designated Funds for the project: Rotary Club of San Carlos, Rotary Club of Redwood City, Rotary Club Peninsula Sunrise, Rotary Club of Menlo Park, Rotary Club of Pacifica, Rotary Club of Millbrae, Rotary Club of South San Francisco, Rotary Club of SF#2; Rotary Club of SF Chinatown; Rotary Club of SF West; Rotary Club of West Marin; Rotary Club of Terra Linda. The grant was finally submitted in August 2019 (during the presidency of Roberto Barone), with DDF amounts of about \$63,000, and cash of about \$32,000, for a global grant amount of about \$175,000 (including matching funds).

Reubens for Rotary 2018. The Morocco project was kicked off in 2015 with the first annual Reubens for Rotary party, which is an all-artisanal fiesta featuring home-cured charcuterie, home-cultured cheeses, home-baked breads, etc. This high-end gourmet smorgasbord usually pulls from 120-150 guests to the home of Steve Carlson. Our party in September 2018 continued this tradition, and featured participation from Devils Canyon Brewery, which contributed a keg of its wares.

Rotary International Barbeque (R.I.B.) Fest. In March 2019, we had the first-ever cooking throwdown, called the R.I.B Fest. Modeled along the lines of the Olympics of cooking, teams represented a country, and prepared barbeque characteristic of that country. Entrants paid a \$1000 sponsorship fee. Team competed, representing Japan, Thailand, USA, Germany, Mexico, Italy, Netherlands, among other locales. Team Japan prevailed, with hibachi skewers and sake.

Hometown Days Fun Run and Pancake Breakfast. We continued the tradition of organizing the Fun Run during the San Carlos Hometown Days festival, followed by the Pancake Breakfast.

Rotary + Returned Peace Corps Volunteer Party. In January 2019, we rented out the Domenico Winery and hosted a joint event coordinated by the Rotary Club of San Carlos, the Rotary Club of Woodside/PV, and the Rotary Club of Mill Valley, together with the National Peace Corps Association. We invited all the Returned Peace Corps Volunteers in the Bay Area. We had about 100 people attend, and local Rotary clubs got several new members out of the event.

Lunch venue. We started the year at The Vans, in Belmont on the hill. Their upstairs meeting room was an excellent venue. Due to The Vans winding down operations, we were forced to find a new lunch venue. After much searching, we ended up moving our meeting location to Trattorio da Vittorio in San Carlos, on Laurel Street. It was very nice to be back in San Carlos. We ate lunch in the main dining room, and then moved to the private dining room in the back for the speaker talk. That split arrangement worked fairly well, and the food was excellent.

Speaker Series. The speaker series was largely organized by President Carlson, who pulled from his professional and familial contacts to orchestrate a fairly lively and insightful group of speakers. A few highlights were: Pete Fallico, DJ (KCSM Jazz 91.1); Eb Bright (medical device entrepreneur); Cyrus Rivetna (architect of Zoroastrian Fire Temples); Suzanne Carlson (local land acquisitions in the National Park Service); Sean Kali-Rai (SV Cannabis Alliance); Drew Dundee (high tech hearing aids); Roseann Rotandaro (head of the Village Link, an aid agency in Sierra Leone), Winston King (General Counsel of Guidewire Software), Scott Bortner (Intellectual Property Counsel at Guardant Health), and Jimmy Carlson (traveler to the Morocco aqueduct project)

As November began, At once again lead the way with another Second Harvest food sort. This time the task was to sort +/- 25,000 lbs. of potatoes. That's a lot of spuds! At wasn't finished as he tirelessly worked to help our Adopt-a-Family program at Heather School. We are all proud that we donated \$2,500 worth of gift cards to be used at Safeway and Target for the families in need at Heather School.

Also in November, our club made the decision to relocate our meeting place from Ristorante da Vittorio to Divino Ristorante in Belmont. A thank you to Terry Wilson for dusting off his typewriter and providing our Club with his writing skills during our "Shelter-in-Place" time with COVID-19. A most sincere thank you to Norbert Strigl for stepping up to become our Club's Secretary. A most sincere thank you to John and Louise Watkins for taking over the responsibilities of being Treasurer when I had to step away from it. A thank you also to John for your important counsel and friendship, something I couldn't do without. A big thank you to our District Governor, Sue Rokaw, and her team of Mitone Griffiths (Chief of Staff), Rick Chinn (Assistant District Governor), Janette Rabin (Assistant District Governor), and many others. A really big thank you to my wife, Kathy, who had to put up with me more than usual because of my time as President.

During the 2021-2022 Club year, Covid-19 and its variants continued to impact our Club's ability to meet in-person. During the prior Club year, we met primarily by Zoom until the last meeting of Chris Davis's term when in- person meetings resumed.
